ISLAMABAD: In a major victory for child's rights activists, a bill against the corporal punishment of children in Islamabad was passed on Tuesday in the National Assembly. The ICT Prohibition of Corporal Punishment Bill, a private member bill, was presented by PML-N MPA Mehnaz Akbar Aziz. An amendment in the bill presented by the government was also passed. According to Minister for Human Rights Shireen Mazari, with the amendment proposed by the government, it will now be possible for complaints to be filed in court. "The previous version of bill stated that complaints must be made to the government committee formed for the purpose," she said. The human rights minister said that now the court can directly be approached.

At the start of the proceedings, the treasury and opposition lawmakers, carrying placards in their hands, stood in front of each other following which NA Speaker Asad Qaisar suspended the proceedings at 16:56 pm.

The sitting resumed at 17:14 pm and took up the agenda appearing on orders of the day. The house passed three private members' bills, which included the Islamabad Capital Territory (ICT) Prohibition of Corporal Punishment Bill, 2020; the ICT Prohibition of Interest on Private Loans, 2020 and the Al-Karam International Institute Bill, 2020. On behalf of the chairman of the Standing Committee on Law and Justice, a member of the Committee presented the report of the Committee on the ICT Prohibition of Corporal Punishment Bill, 2020. GENEVA: Raising the Kashmir issue at the United Nations Human Rights Council, Turkey has called for resolving the decades-old dispute on the basis of UN resolutions and the "legitimate" expectations of Kashmiri people who are struggling for their right of self-determination. "We reiterate our call to

the Government of India to ease current restrictions in Jammu and Kashmir," Foreign Minister Mevlut Cavusoglu told the 47-member Council in Geneva. "We wish for the resolution of the issue through peaceful means on the basis of the relevant United Nations resolutions and the legitimate expectations of the people of Jammu and Kashmir," the Turkish foreign minister added. The Council on Monday began its month-long, 46th session, which is being held almost entirely remotely to prevent the spread of COVID-19. In Washington, Dr. Ghulam Nabi Fai, Secretary-General of the World Kashmir Awareness Forum, welcomed Cavusoglu's remarks about the deteriorating situation in Indian occupied Kashmir. "This has been the consistent policy of the Erdogan administration to sensitize the world opinion to help bring parties concerned together to resolve the Kashmir dispute for the sake of peace and security not only in Kashmir but in the region of South Asia," he said. "The people of Jammu & Kashmir were heartened to listen to Mr. Cavusoglu explaining before the world body the principle aspect of the Kashmir issue," Dr. Fai said. He added that the time has come for the world powers to find a solution to the Kashmir dispute between nuclear-armed India and Pakistan.

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Afghan peace talks resume amid violence

DOHA: Peace talks between the Taliban and the Afghan government have resumed in the Qatari capital Doha after weeks of delays, escalating violence and a change in US diplomatic leadership as the Biden administration began. Taliban spokesman Mohammad Naeem tweeted on Monday night the resumption of the talks, which were the outcome of an agreement between the Afghan armed group and the US in February 2020. But the administration of President Joe Biden is reviewing the

agreement, which was aimed at ending the longest war the US has fought. The Taliban has been fighting the combined forces of the Western-backed Kabul government and foreign troops since it was toppled in a US-led invasion of Afghanistan in 2001. Last week, the Taliban in an open letter called on the US to fully implement the Doha accord, including the withdrawal of all international troops, saying it had committed to its side of the deal - to secure US security interests in the war-torn country. There were no details about the talks except for an announcement

that the first item of business would be setting the agenda. When talks ended abruptly in January, days after they began, both sides submitted their wish lists for agendas which they now have to sift through to agree on negotiation items and the order in which they will be tackled. The priority for the Afghan government, Washington and NATO is a serious reduction in violence that can lead to a ceasefire, the Taliban have until now resisted any immediate ceasefire. Washington is reviewing the Doha peace agreement the previous Trump administration signed with

the Taliban as consensus mounts in Washington that a delay of the withdrawal deadline is needed. The Taliban have resisted suggestions of even a brief extension. NATO Secretary-General Jens Stoltenberg said last week that the troops from the transatlantic alliance would not withdraw from Afghanistan "before the time is right", adding that the Taliban must do more to meet the terms of the agreement with the US. The resumption in talks in Doha comes on the heels of hectic diplomatic activity, including reaching out to Pakistani officials and its powerful Army Chief General

Qamar Javed Bajwa. Pakistan is seen as critical to getting the Taliban back to the negotiating table, and it can use its influence to pressure the Taliban to reduce violence in Afghanistan. Last week, the head of US Central Command, General Kenneth F McKenzie, was in Islamabad, as was Russian President Vladimir Putin's Afghan envoy, Zamir Kabulov and Qatari foreign ministry special envoy Mutlaq Bin Majed Al Qahtani. Afghan President Ashraf Ghani's special envoy Umar Daudzai is expected in Islamabad on Wednesday.

COVID-19 claims 41 more lives

Forty one corona patients have died during past 24 hours, 38 of them were under treatment in hospital and three in their respective quarantines and homes on Monday, according to the latest update issued by the National command and Operation Centre (NCO).

NA-75: RO submits details to ECP

ISLAMABAD: The returning officer of the NA-75 Daska by-election has submitted details of irregularities before the Election Commission of Pakistan. Chief Election Commissioner (CEC) Sikandar Sultan Raja presided over a five-member bench meeting on Tuesday. The commission was meeting after the results for the NA-75 Daska by-polls had been withheld due to violence and alleged voting fraud. The results will now be announced by the ECP after a proper inquiry. The CEC had summoned Ali Asjad and Nosheen Iftikhar, both leading candidates belonging to the PTI and PML-N, respectively, to the federal capital for the hearing. During the proceedings, PTI's candidate Ali Asjad Malhi appeared before the panel and vowed to accept the decision of the commission.

Rupee gains 18 paise against dollar

ISLAMABAD: The exchange rate of Pakistani rupee strengthened by 18 paise against the US dollar in the interbank trading on Tuesday and closed at Rs158.88 as compared to the previous day's closing of Rs159.06. Meanwhile, according to Forex Association of Pakistan, the buying and selling rates of dollar in the open market were recorded at Rs158.8 and Rs159.5 respectively. In interbank trading, the price of euro appreciated by 75 paise and closed at Rs193.18 against the last day's trading of Rs 192.43, State Bank of Pakistan reported. The Japanese Yen gained one paise to close at Rs1.51, whereas an increase of 99 paise was witnessed in the exchange rate of British Pound which was traded at Rs223.63 as compared to its last closing of Rs222.64. The exchange rates of Emirates Dirham and Saudi Riyal declined by 05 paise each to close at Rs 43.25 and Rs 42.36 respectively. — APP

Minister orders strict monitoring of essential items' prices

LAHORE: Provincial Minister for Industries and Trade Mian Aslam Iqbal Tuesday directed the administration as well as line departments to regularly and strictly monitor prices and supply and demand of essential items in the markets. According to the Provincial Industries Department here, the minister directed that every effort should be made to sell quality items at government fixed rates and consumers' rights should be protected. He ordered for continuing indiscriminate crackdown on hoarders and illegal profiteers as the mafia did not deserve any leniency. "Jail is the best place for those who usurp public rights by earning illegal profit and anti-people elements will not be allowed to add to miseries of the masses for the sake of some coins," the minister added. Legitimate profit was the right of sellers, but illegal profiteering was a dacoity, he said and vowed to go to every extent to protect consumers' rights. The government would not leave the people at the mercy of exploiters and the administration should remain fully vigilant to overcome hoarding and illegal profiteering.

JI announces new series of protests

KARACHI: Jamaat-e-Islami (JI) Karachi chief Hafiz Naeemur Rehman has announced a new series of protests under Huqooqi-Karachi Movement [Karachi Rights' Movement] from February 28. Hafiz Naeemur Rehman said in a statement that Huqooqi-Karachi Movement of Jamaat-e-Islami (JI) is underway and a 'big demonstration' will be organised on M A Jinnah Road on February 28. While unveiling further plans for the upcoming protests in a press conference today, the JI Karachi chief said that a rally will be taken out on March 14 to get the attention of the rulers towards the miseries of Karachiites. Naeemur Rehman said that JI Karachi will organise a social media competition for raising the civic issues of the metropolis. He reiterated the demand for conducting a 15-year forensic audit of the sole power provider of the metropolis, KElectric.

He censured the rulers for showing their enmity with the economic hub of Pakistan after extending the quota system. The JI Karachi chief also criticised that the approval of the population census has also shown their enmity with the Karachi citizens. Jamaat-e-Islami will begin its public contact campaign to get the support of all segments of the society for the ongoing campaign for Karachi rights. He announced that JI will soon issue a white paper regarding education and demanded to award scholarships to Karachi students. Sindh CM orders resolution of pension issues of employees

KARACHI: Sindh chief Minister Syed Murad Ali Shah has directed all the departments, particularly the local bodies, authorities and different boards and other semi government organizations to resolve the pension issues of their employees and report to him. He took this decision while presiding over a cabinet meeting here at New Sindh Secretariat on Tuesday. The meeting was attended by all the provincial ministers, senior advisor, Chief Secretary Mumtaz Shah, chairman P&D Mohammad Waseem and

concerned secretaries.

At the outset of the meeting, the chief minister was told that there were pension issues of local bodies employees. "An employee who retires from his/her service must be given their pension and dues in time," he said and added the local bodies such as KMC, DMCs, sukkr municipal corporation and such other have failed to develop payment of pension mechanism, therefore the employees have run from pillar to post for their legitimate right. "This is unfair and should be addressed on priority basis," he ordered. Murad

Ali Shah directed the chief secretary to personally resolve the issue so that payment pension and other areas may be resolved once for all.

Teachers transfer policy: The education department presented a transfer policy for teaching staff of school education department saying that with the aim to ensure continuity of teachers during an academic year and restrain frequent transfer and postings, especially transfer of teachers from remote rural areas to urban areas, a ban on transfer was imposed on November 5, 2018. — DNA

PML-N again shifts its stance: Fawad

ISLAMABAD: Federal Minister for Science and Technology, Chaudhry Fawad Hussain on Tuesday said the Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N) had again shifted its stance on re-polling in 20 polling stations to re-polling in the whole constituency. "PML-N raised objection over polling in the 20 polling stations in the by-elections and demanded re-polls on which we agreed but now it has changed its stance and demanding re-election in the whole constituency, making the elections disputed", he said. The minister was talking to the media outside Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP) along with the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) leaders including Usman Dar, Farrukh Habib and the party candidate Ali Asjad Malhi. He said legally, ECP was not authorized to hold the results after compilation and this was also not our obligation to withdraw writ of demanding ECP to announce the results of PTI success in NA-75 (Daska) immediately.

However, the Prime Minister Imran Khan yesterday asked not to resist PML-N application of re-polling in 20 polling stations and directed Ali Asjad Malhi to withdraw his application without resistance. "PTI candidate has foregone his legal right", the federal minister said. It was for the first time that any government had not shown its power in the by-election, he said. Chaudhry Fawad said the Prime Minister had always taken steps to ensure transparent elections, "He is such a person who introduced a neutral empire in the cricket". Following the same vision and principle, the Prime Minister wanted to make this election impartial and transparent. The government had also initiated efforts to make the senate elections transparent, he said. The masses have witnessed the by-elections conducted in the past but they were happy since PTI took over, he said adding, ECP was working as an independent institution and they have great respect for their decisions. — APP

Joint opp seeks Haleem's production order

KARACHI: The joint opposition in Sindh Assembly has submitted a request in the assembly secretariat for issuance of a production order for Opposition Leader in SA, Haleem Adil Sheikh. Sheikh is currently hospitalised after he was allegedly attacked by goons of gang war in Karachi Central Jail. Speaker Sindh Assembly, Agha Siraj Durrani said few members of the joint opposition moved a request for Haleem Adil Sheikh's production orders. Until now the assembly session has been not summoned, the application will be reviewed in accordance with the law, he said. Answering a question, Agha Siraj Durrani said what the opposition leader said he is unaware because when Sheikh was taken into custody, he was not here. The PTI leader was moved to NICVD after he complained pain in the chest, earlier this week. It may be recalled that an anti-terrorism court (ATC), last week, sent Leader of the Opposition in the Sindh Assembly Haleem Adil to jail on judicial remand in a case pertaining to interference in official affairs. — DNA

Senator Sirajul Haq demands lifting ban on student union

LAHORE: Jamaat-e-Islami Emir Senator Sirajul Haq has demanded the government lift ban on student union, providing millions of students an opportunity to exercise their democratic and constitutional right. "Ban on student unions was imposed in Zia regime and it remained intact during tenures of civil governments which is proof of their insincerity to the democratic cause," he said while talking to a delegation of Islami Jamiat Talba at Mansoor on Tuesday. "Without the existence of independent student unions in educational institutes, the potential of leaders would

never come to light and they would never reach a platform from where they could serve Pakistan."

He said the governments of the PTI, the PML-N and the PPP failed to prove their democratic credentials and they befooled the youth with mere sloganeering and tall claims. He said the PTI failed to bring improvement in education sector. He said the government had announced the single national curriculum would be implemented in January 2020 but it seemed the claim would hardly be fulfilled in its tenure.

He said the government made cut in higher education budget which badly affected multiple ongoing projects. He said the politicians and bureaucrats

would be able to better judge the plethora of problems of the government educational institutions if their children studied in them. He regretted the few hundred families ruled over country for decades, capturing the resources of Pakistan and depriving millions of people from their basic rights.

He said the elite ruling over country used their power and wealth to influence the electoral system and get their desired results. He said there must be check on these evil practices and the youth should pay their role to highlight the problems. He said young generation must struggle to strengthen the Islamic and democratic values in the country. He said youth was the future of Pakistan.

The digitally equipped control room has been set up to oversee large operations education Conditional Cash Transfer (CCT) programme, considering the importance of central capability to monitor. To assist with this, 25 Compliance Monitoring Coordinators have been hired who would monitor

the control room and 882 Compliance Monitors have been hired for monitoring in the field. Over the last two years, comprehensive and deep-rooted reforms were deployed as a result of which massive reforms have been substantiated in the Waseela-e-Taleem Digital. There are four key pillars of reforms. First, end-to-end digitization of a number of processes, which are previously managed manually. Apps have been developed which are used by staff to register children and monitor compliance. Secondly, cost-effective changes institutional infrastructure was developed to expand this program nationwide and reliance on Non-Government



Organizations was eliminated. Because of this, operational cost has been reduced from eight to three percent. Third, the stipend given to children has been modified as per Ehsaas' new Stipend policy. Children of poorest families will now be provided conditional cash

grants of Rs. 1,500 for boy child and Rs. 2,000 per quarter for girl child on attainment of 70 per cent attendance in school. Finally, and most importantly, the program is being expanded to all districts of the country. "Since the system is made end to end digital, monitoring is bedrocked in digital means as well. In this regard, a new cohort of qualified Compliance Monitors have been taken on board duly following hiring procedures of the government", Dr. Sania Nishtar said. She said, "Compliance Monitoring Coordinators stationed in the Control Room have access to dashboards where they can track performance of all those in the field who are tracking attendance

of children. Attendance is important as on that basis, Ehsaas stipends are delivered." Linked to Policy #73 of "Ehsaas Education Conditional Cash Transfers", the scale up and reform of Waseela-e-Taleem Digital falls under Pillar III, "Human Capital Development" of the Ehsaas Strategy. Education CCTs are an important pillar of any social protection strategy. Education CCTs serve the twofold purpose of socially assisting vulnerable households and at the same time reduce the number of out of school children. When transfers are linked to incentives for investments in human capital, they help reduce inter-generational transmission of poverty as well.

NAB recovers 562 acres land as plea bargain

ISLAMABAD: The National Accountability Bureau (NAB) on Tuesday informed the Accountability Court (AC) that it had recovered 562 acres government land worth Rs21 billions as plea bargain from accused Ahsan Elahi in fake accounts reference. The court endorsed the plea bargain after inquiry it from the accused. ACI Judge Muhammad Bashir heard the fake accounts case pertaining to illegal allotment of land. Deputy Prosecutor General National Accountability Bureau (NAB) Sardar Muzafar Abbasi informed the court that his department had recovered land worth Rs 21 billions from the accused as plea bargain in fake accounts reference. Ahsan Elahi who was an accused of land grabbing had confessed his crime, he said, adding that the NAB had recovered a total 562 acres land in plea. He said that a committee had transferred this land to Ghulam Hussain Hilari and Yousaf Edhi in 2012, adding that secretary board of revenue Shahzer Shamon, Deputy Commissioner Malir Qazi Jan Muhammad and Ghulam Mustafa Phal were part of the committee. He stated that it also include the 262 acres land owned by Pakistan Steel Mills. The Sindh government had taken this land from mill to construct university and oil tankers' yard.

WAPDA to rehabilitate Rasul Hydel Power Station

ISLAMABAD: The Water and Power Development Authority (WAPDA) has planned to rehabilitate 69-year old Rasul Hydel Power Station located at a link between Upper Jhelum and Lower Jhelum Canals near Khokhra Head Works in Mandi Bahauddin District of Punjab Province. Rasul Hydel Power Station was commissioned in 1952 with an installed capacity of 22 Mega Watt (MW), said a press release. It was the biggest hydel power project of Pakistan that was commissioned after independence. Since its commissioning, the Hydel Power Station has contributed about 5.5 billion units of low-cost, clean, green and environment-friendly electricity to the National Grid. The reduced efficiency of the equipment due to obsolete technology and aging factor have necessitated rehabilitation of the Hydel Power Station to regain and increase its generation capacity. An in-house feasibility study has been completed to proceed further to implement rehabilitation of Rasul Hydel Power Station.

2 dacoit gangs busted; seven arrested

RAWALPINDI: In a crackdown against criminal elements, Rawalpindi Police have busted two dacoit gangs and arrested their seven members besides recovering cash and four pistols 30 bore from their possession. According to a police spokesman, Sadiqabad police in a raid arrested Nasir, Anwar, Yasir and Usman, four dacoit gang members of 'Mani' gang and recovered cash, four 30 bore pistols and other items from their possession. He informed that the Police team constituted under the supervision of SHO Sadiqabad Police Station on the directives of SP Rawal conducted a raid and managed to net the gang members. As per preliminary police record, the criminals were also involved in other crimes, he added. He stated that other members and facilitators of the gang would also be arrested following preliminary investigations with the detainee culprits. Meanwhile, Airport police rounded up three members of another dacoit gang namely Shahid, Bilal and Ali. They are members of 'Boxer' gang, he added.

USC to announce Ramzan package from April 1

ISLAMABAD: Managing Director, Utility Stores Corporation (USC) Umer Lodhi on Tuesday announced that a special Ramzan discount Package would start from April 1 at all utility stores of the country with affordable rates, giving subsidy to over 19 essential commodities. Talking to a private news channel, he said like every year, USC would announce a special Ramzan relief package for citizens which would continue till Eid UL Fit, adding, this Ramzan relief package would be more special as compared to previous years. He said in the light of the present experiences of high prices of food items in market, a comprehensive steps would be taken for the provision of best facilities to people during Ramzan. The MD said the package would be approved by the Economic Coordination Council (ECC). He said smooth supply of all commodities across the country would also be ensured during the holy month. USC MD said that a special mechanism to monitor stock and availability of necessary food items at the utility stores would also be installed at district level. The MD said USC would maintain stocks of daily essential items to act as a price moderator in the market to prevent profiteering and hoarding, adding, the corporation would buy quality items directly from producers and sell them at cheaper prices. Replying to a query about high prices, he denied that the prices of milk, sugar, flour and ghee were yet stable and there was no any price difference but in coming days the price of ghee would increase 30 percent due to prices of manufacturing. He mentioned that the USC network has been playing an important role in providing essential items at discounted prices to the masses as the prices of USC are significantly low as compared to the prices prevailing in domestic markets. - DNA

NEPRA reserves judgment on KE petition

ISLAMABAD: The National Electric Power Regulatory Authority (Neptra) on Tuesday reserved judgment on a petition filed for hike in power tariff under fuel adjustment mechanism. Tauseef Farooqi, Chairman NEPRA, heard a plea of KE to increase the price of electricity by Rs 1.71 per unit. During the hearing, National Electric Power Regulatory Authority (NEPRA) Chairman Tauseef Farooqi has directed K Electric, the primary power supplier of Karachi to improve its system, saying that the situation like the past year summers should not occur this time. K Electric officials told NEPRA that the situation will be better in the upcoming summer season as the first unit of Bin Qasim 3 Plant will be ready by May 15 and the completion of the unit will generate 450 MW of electricity. The KE officials told the meeting that the sole power supplier for the metropolis has signed a power purchase agreement with the government for an additional supply of 1400 megawatts of electricity. NEPRA, while concluding the hearing on the request for hike in power tariff, remarked that it would take a decision after reviewing all the facts and figures. It is pertinent to mention here that the National Electric Power Regulatory Authority (Neptra) recently had approved an increase of Rs1.95 per unit in power tariff, putting an additional burden of Rs200 billion on consumers. According to the power regulator, the tariff hike will be applicable to all consumers including lifeline consumers using 50 units in a month.

Traders urge to take action against encroachment

RAWALPINDI: Traders on Tuesday expressed concerns on increasing encroachments on roads and demanded of the district administration to remove illegal construction affecting their business and causing frequent traffic jams. President Traders Welfare Association Sharjeel Mir led by a delegation met Deputy Commissioner (DC) Capt (r) Anwar Ul Haq here and conveyed their concern regarding growing encroachments in the markets. He said illegal car parking was becoming a common practice, creating nuisance for them. He said they were losing their customers as they were forced to park their vehicles far away due to lack of proper parking place and encroachments. "Proper parking plazas for city markets and strict action against encroachments were direly needed", he demanded. The DC assured the traders that their concerns would be addressed on priority. — APP

MoNHSRC dissatisfied with 'slow' vaccination

ISLAMABAD: The Ministry of National Health Services has expressed dissatisfaction over the pace of vaccination of frontline health workers against the coronavirus in Islamabad. In a letter to the capital's public and private hospitals as well as labs, the ministry pointed out that the vaccination pace is slow as less than half of the total registered health workers have been inoculated against the virus as yet. It lamented that the vaccination pace didn't pick up despite its directives in this regard. A total of 8,000 health workers got themselves registered for Covid-19 vaccination in the first phase but a mere 3,200 have been administered jobs, even though vaccination counters remain operational throughout the week in Islamabad. The ministry stressed that the vaccination of health workers is the need of the hour, advising medics and paramedical staff working at health facilities of the capital to get jobs on a priority basis. It said the second phase that will see citizens aged 65 and above getting the vaccine will start next month.

Likewise, in PGPR, an institution or a university is reviewed to check whether or not it is implementing HEC minimum criteria for launching MS/MPH and PhD programmes. The purpose of these evaluations is to bring improvement in higher education sector so that ultimate objective of quality could be achieved.

CDA committed to ensure water supply during summer

Work of restoration and repairing of pipes is also underway in other areas. 17 tankers are being used to provide water in the areas where there is issue of water. Pipeline of the water works of sector G-10 has been made functional. New cable has been installed in sector G-9/3.

SBP defers Rs 657.16B under refinancing scheme

ISLAMABAD: The State Bank of Pakistan (SBP), under its refinancing scheme for protecting businesses from the impact of COVID-19, has so far deferred Rs657.14 billion principal repayments of loans up to one year. The bank also allowed restructuring or rescheduling of around Rs235.8 billion so far, according to the updated data of the central bank. The number of borrowers that would benefit from this rescheduling relief has risen to 1,767,599 with outstanding amount of Rs 2.54 billion, it said. Under its Rozgar scheme for protecting businesses and employees working with them from the impact of COVID-19, the central bank has so far approved Rs238.2 billion for 2,958 businesses. Meanwhile, the bank under this refinancing scheme for hospitals to combat COVID-19, approved financing of Rs10.073 billion for 43 hospitals so far. As many as 46 hospitals had requested for the financing amounting to Rs13.8 billion.

With respect to progress on refinancing scheme for setting up new projects or expansion, the central bank approved 457 projects with an amount of Rs385.7 billion for which it received requests for 629 projects with amount of Rs 704.8 billion. Furthermore, from March 20, 2020 to February 19, the Bank had issued fresh currency notes to the commercial banks worth of Rs1.411 trillion. Similarly an amount of Rs 46.6 billion was quarantined during the period that was received from hospitals, clinics, and pharmacies. While overall the bank received cash worth of Rs1.45 trillion which was quarantined for 14 days. It is pertinent to mention here that in order to combat the impact of COVID-19 and to help the businesses in payment of wages and salaries to their workers and employees and thereby support continued employment in this challenging environment, State Bank of Pakistan (SBP) has introduced a temporary refinancing scheme for payment of wages and salaries to the workers and employees of the business concerns.

AC hears reference against Gilani

ISLAMABAD: An accountability court (AC) on Tuesday heard a graft case related to awarding an alleged illegal advertisement contract against former Prime Minister Yousuf Raza Gilani and others. AC Judge Muhammad Azam Khan presided over the hearing. NAB prosecutor Mirza Usman appeared before the court in person. The lawyer of Farooq Awan, co-accused in the reference pleaded with the court to strike down his client's name from the Exit Control List (ECL), citing his health issues. "My client is being treated abroad and he should be allowed to appear before the court through a representative." Meanwhile, the NAB prosecutor opposed the plea and said in his supporting arguments that for any leniency the accused should appear before the court first. Later, the hearing was adjourned until March 15. The National Accountability Bureau (NAB) approved filing corruption references against former Prime Minister Yousuf Raza Gilani and others for their alleged involvement in illegally awarding an advertisement contract in violation of Public Procurement Regulatory Authority (PPRA) rules. The other accused in the case included former secretary Information Technology Farooq Awan, former principal information officer Muhammad Saleem, Syed Hassan Sheikh, Inam Akbar, and other officials of the Ministry of Information Technology, who allegedly misused their authority which caused a loss of Rs128.07 million to the national exchequer.

IHC removes objections on bench in blasphemy case

ISLAMABAD: The Islamabad High Court (IHC) on Tuesday removed the plaintiff's objections on the bench in appeals against death sentences to the accused of blasphemy who uploaded blasphemous content on social media. The court ordered the registrar office to fix the appeals for hearing after removing the objections. Chief Justice Athar Minallah, hearing the case, remarked that objecting bench in such cases was like expressing doubt on the faith of concerned judge. Whether the petitioner had any doubt on my faith, the chief justice questioned. The petitioner's lawyer said that his client had no doubt on faith of anybody, the reasons of objection had been mentioned in application given in chamber. The court asked the lawyer to once again take instructions from his client and adjourned hearing of the case till next date. — APP

3 quacks arrested, 10 clinics sealed

ISLAMABAD: Islamabad Capital Territory (ICT) administration Tuesday arrested three quacks and sealed ten clinics in Bhara Kahu. Assistant Commissioner Aneel Saeed along with District Health Officer Dr Zaeem Zia and local station house officer conducted raids in various areas of Bhara Kahu, including Simli Dam road, New Abadi and others, following public complaints regarding the quackery. Talking to media, the assistant commissioner appealed the masses to figure out the quacks so that the illegal medical practice could be controlled in their areas. He said the administration had also taken action against the medical stores selling drugs without prescription of the certified doctors. Saeed asked the Islamabad denizens not to visit illegal medical practitioners to save their money and health. "No one will be allowed to play with the lives of citizens," he remarked and added the law would take its course if someone found involved in this heinous business. He said it was the priority of ICT administration to ensure the provision of basic health facilities to the citizens. Meanwhile, ICT team also inspected various meat and vegetable shops to ensure quality edibles to the people. — APP

Handling threats

THE recent uptick in violence in Afghanistan undoubtedly stems from local power struggles, but it is clear that foreign influence also has a big part to play. Pakistan's revelations on this subject have so far not received the right sort of traction. But given our familiarity with the conflict Kabul and the rest of the country is mired in, it is important for international powers to pay heed. India's funding of non-state actors in Afghanistan is undoubtedly a major cause for the flare-up and resulting doubts being sown about the peace deal. It must be remembered that New Delhi's longstanding policy of Pakistan's encirclement and diplomatic isolation remains the key focus for the Modi government. Rs500 million have been allocated to fund terror groups in Afghanistan, but this is only one aspect of the double game being played by the eastern neighbour. Apart from sponsoring terror groups to attack Pakistan, as reiterated by the DGISPR in another press conference on Monday, Afghanistan would also do well to protect itself from Indian influence. India continues to provide military support to the Afghan government while also funding terrorists, thereby ensuring that both sides continue to engage in conflict. A peaceful Afghanistan is of no use to India; opportunities for cross border attacks from Pakistan's western front would be fairly limited. States such as Pakistan and China have long dreamt of regional peace for decades. It is easy to take a cue from the DGISPR's helpful words yesterday, regarding operations to root out terrorism. It is clear that our security forces are capable of handling anything India throws at us, through both conventional and non-conventional routes. As always, there is still work to be done to fight terror here on home soil. But our consistent efforts and the vigilance of our forces will lead us to victory against the unlawful warmongering actions of our belligerent neighbor.

UNFORTUNATELY, The Republic of Azerbaijan faced severer genocides in the last two centuries which was indeed heartbreaking and bleeding wounds. Genocide was crime against humanity and humans/Azerbaijanis. It was act of state terrorism. It was act of ethnic cleansing. The "Khojaly genocide" was action of inconceivable cruelty during which inhuman punitive methods was used. Armenians chauvinists and their supportive forces violated the rights of Azerbaijani people, created the obstacles to get the education in native language and exerted a strong pressure upon them. The historical names of Azerbaijani villages were changed. History of human evolution and civilization has been swinging between the pendulum of evilness and search of genuine equality, unlimited tragedies and tranquillities, barbarism and vivid reflection of best human qualities, genocides and genosities, discriminations and diversities. In this regard, Khojaly tragedy showcased momentum of evil energies whereas, The Center of Global & Strategic Studies, Islamabad is the hub of positive energy, channelizing human spirits towards greater resolution, infinite voyage of peace, harmony, dignity and development. It was one of the most serious crimes not only against the people of Azerbaijan, but humanity as a whole. The Khojaly genocide is comparable to the genocides in Khatin, Hiroshima, Nagasaki and Songmi. Khojaly reflected the history and traditions of Azerbaijan since the ancient times. Its culture is classified as Khojaly-Gadabay in the Azerbaijani history. Cromlechs, dolmens, Cyclops, tumulus's of Khojaly, as well as different housing wares are the patterns of material culture that re-

fect the dynamics of social development. The destruction of all these material culture monuments and Khojaly graveyard one of the most ancient cemeteries in history after the Armenian occupation is are obvious examples of Armenian barbarism and aggression against the world culture. The people of Azerbaijan were deported from their historical lands and became refugees and internally displaced persons (IDPs) because of Armenian illegal occupation. Azerbaijanis were also forced from their historical lands during the Soviet period. 150,000 Azerbaijanis were deported from Armenia and placed in the Kur-Araz plain from 1948-1953. 250,000 Azerbaijanis were forced from their historical territories in 1988 and Armenia became a mono-ethnic state. The Daghigh Garabagh events, which started in 1988 along with continuous efforts to implement the Armenian desire of building a state from sea to sea, led to the destruction of towns and villages, murder of thousands of innocent people, as well as the exile of hundreds of thousands of Azerbaijanis from their native lands. To achieve dreams of great Armenian its nationalists expanded their illegal activities in the early 20th century. It was coined by the Dashnaksutun Party which systematically expelled Azerbaijanis from their historical lands and native homes and embarked on a policy of ethnic cleansing and genocide. For example, in 1905-1906 the Armenians committed massacres against Azerbaijani civilians in Baku, Ganja, Karabakh, Irevan, Nakhchivan, Ordubad, Sharur-Daralayaz, Tiflis, Zangezur, Gazakh and other places, perpetrated ruthless massacres against the local population, burned and destroyed cities and villages. Armenian armed forces destroyed more than 200 Azerbaijani villages in Shusha, Zangezur and Jabrayil region, Irevan and Ganja provinces, expelling tens of thousands of Azerbaijanis from their homes Human bloods were everywhere and beasts were in search of innocent Azerbaijanis. Bloody events soon spread out covering the entire territory of Azerbaijan. In March-April 1918, about 8,000 civilians were slaughtered in Shamakhi. Armenian gangs stormed the city, setting houses on fire. Those who were trying to escape from the fire were shot. The majority of Muslim monuments of culture, including the Friday Mosque of Shamakhi, were set on fire and burnt to the ground with elderly, women and children

hiding in it. People were buried alive, while some were brutally tortured before being killed. Moreover, Armenian nationalists killed with utmost cruelty more than 16,000 people in Guba, the "valley of blood" in the first five months of 1918. The facts of mass extermination of the Azerbaijanis of Guba by Armenian-Dashnak gangs were proven again in the 21st century the discovery in 2007 of mass graves in Guba is a fact confirming the Armenian brutality. The study of the burial site revealed that people were subjected to unprecedented violence and killed with cruelty during the Armenian armed attack on Guba in 1918. A ruthless massacre of the Azerbaijanis was also perpetrated in Shusha, Irevan, Zangezur, Karabakh, Nakhchivan, Kars and other regions. When committing these atrocities on historical Azerbaijani lands, the Armenians burned schools and mosques and destroyed samples of material culture of Azerbaijanis. During genocides humanity was "bleed" and "beasts" were everywhere in different cities of Azerbaijan but it could not strike-down the true spirits of interfaith harmony, patriotism, national pride and communal unity and people having diversity of faith, belief and origin stood fast to fight against all odds. Cities were sieged and darkness was everywhere. Men were arrested. Media was blocked and the people were deprived of the right to access information. There was complete chaos. Azerbaijanis were determined to protect their territorial integrity and did not step back, showing their sacrifice and vigor for the national freedom. Genocides against Azerbaijanis also uphold "grief" which has enduring human befitting propositions. It united the people of Azerbaijan despite ethnic diversity and strengthened their resolve to achieve that independence. Ultimately, it sustained values of faith, courage, and the strength of human spirits which are universal and everlasting. It was act of perseverance and will to move on and move forward with a better life, a life of freedom, fairness, tolerance and peace and it had also left an even stronger and even greater impression in daily lives of people to centralization of command to national politics to the regional geopolitics. To conclude, genocides against Azerbaijan achieved nothing but widespread condemnation. Rather it fueled concepts of self-defense, self-reliance, economic sustainability, protection of national pride, safety of heritage and unbending passions for territorial sovereignty. Khojaly grief shadows has been converted into shining Azerbaijan due to which it has now achieved and secured a miraculous victory and de-occupied Nagorno karabakh and others areas from Armenia after 30 years. Ending the forever war in Afghanistan

The Biden administration must also decide what to do about America's NATO allies, which together have substantially more forces in Afghanistan than the US does. And – as the post-Soviet experience indicates – it must devise a plan for influencing the situation in the country and region after the withdrawal. The challenge is formidable. Afghanistan is one of the world's poorest countries

SPEAKING in Kabul on this month's 32nd anniversary of the Soviet Union's withdrawal from Afghanistan, the country's president, Ashraf Ghani, made an important distinction. The civil war that devastated Afghanistan after the withdrawal was caused not by the departure of Soviet troops, but by the failure to formulate a viable plan for Afghanistan's future. As the US considers its own exit from the country, it should heed this lesson. After withdrawing its troops in 1989, the Soviet Union continued to provide financial support to the communist-nationalist regime led by Mohammed Najibullah. However, lacking domestic legitimacy, Najibullah's regime quickly collapsed when Russia withdrew its financial support in 1992, triggering the civil war. Then, in 1996, the Taliban gained control of Kabul and, ultimately, the country. The Taliban remained in power until 2001, when a US-led invasion – spurred by the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks – ended its rule. Last February, then-US President Donald Trump's administration reached a deal with the Taliban intended to end the nearly 20-year-long war: The US and its NATO allies would withdraw all troops by May 2021 if the Taliban fulfilled certain commitments, including cutting ties with terrorist groups and reducing violence. The Taliban would also have to engage in meaningful negotiations with the Afghan government, which was not involved in the deal. The Trump administration apparently hoped that an intra-Afghan peace agreement would materialize by the designated withdrawal date, ending the fighting and minimizing the risk that Afghanistan would become a haven

for terrorists. That has not happened. While US force levels are down to near 2,000 troops, fighting in Afghanistan has not decreased. On the contrary, a US watchdog agency reports that the Taliban carried out more attacks in the last quarter of 2020 than during the same period of 2019. Moreover, the latest intra-Afghan talks, which began in Doha in September, have produced virtually no results. It seems that the Taliban's plan was to keep fighting until US troops left, at which point they might be able to secure a victory in the long war. Now, however, they face the possibility that US troops will not leave nearly as soon as expected. President Joe Biden's administration has announced that it is reviewing the deal to determine whether the Taliban is "living up to its commitments." The Biden administration must also decide what to do about America's NATO allies, which together have substantially more forces in Afghanistan than the US does. And – as the post-Soviet experience indicates – it must devise a plan for influencing the situation in the country and region after the withdrawal. The challenge is formidable. Afghanistan is one of the world's poorest countries. Today, the Afghan state's income amounts to little more than a third of what the US pays only to sustain its various security forces, to say nothing of US aid to the civilian sector (which, to be sure, amounts to less than half Europe's contributions). In fact, Afghanistan has depended on outside support to sustain its statehood since Russia and Britain played their "Great Game" in the 19th century. As it stands, the US seems to be leaning toward maintaining some sort of security pres-

ence, focused on fighting the terrorists of Al-Qaeda and Daesh, beyond the May deadline. German Foreign Minister Heiko Maas has advocated this approach. But there are risks. The Taliban could reject this solution, leading to an intensification of fighting and renewed attacks on international forces. US Special Representative for Afghanistan Reconciliation Zalmay Khalilzad is most likely already working to assess this risk. The Taliban's acceptance of a continued security presence may depend on progress in the intra-Afghan talks, though no one seems to have a clear vision for a power-sharing agreement. The gap between today's Islamic Republic and the Taliban's desired Islamic Emirate is wide, and narrowing it will require a recalibration of the diplomatic process concerning Afghanistan. To that end, regional powers – including Iran, Russia and China – should be engaged in all talks about the country's future, with one or two also taking a more active role in facilitating the intra-Afghan political dialogue. In this process, managing the dynamics between India and Pakistan, for which developments in Afghanistan hold profound national security implications, will undoubtedly emerge as a key challenge. Indeed, Russia is currently taking the initiative in this regard. The pressure in the US and elsewhere to end the "forever war" in Afghanistan is understandable. But, as Ghani wisely warned, simply withdrawing international forces is unlikely to yield that result. To avoid a new spiral of violence, we must first determine what will come after. - Courtesy: Arab News

CANBERRA: Facebook has agreed to restore Australian news pages after the government offered amendments to legislation that would force tech giants to pay for media content displayed on their platforms.

The deal on Tuesday came amid a standoff that lasted more than a week between the Australian government and the social media group over the so-called Media Bargaining Code. Facebook and Google strongly

opposed the draft Australian legislation, which will force the tech giants to reach commercial deals with Australian publishers or face compulsory arbitration. The bill passed the House of Representatives last Wednesday, prompting Facebook to block its 13 million Australian users from accessing and sharing all news on its platform. The blackout also erased content on the pages of emergency services, health authorities and non-profit organisations, sparking widespread outrage.

Armenian PM Pashinyan
faces fresh calls to quit

YEREVAN: Months-long calls for Armenian Prime Minister Nikol Pashinyan to resign escalated again on Tuesday, as thousands of protesters staged the third demonstration in a week demanding he quit over his handling of the Nagorno-Karabakh conflict with Azerbaijan. Police cordons were deployed to guard government buildings near Republic Square in the capital Yerevan, with officers accompanying Pashinyan when he walked from one

building to another as demonstrators shouted "traitor!".

A day earlier, protesters marched to Yerevan's France Square and blocked several adjacent streets, temporarily paralysing traffic in the area.

The demonstrations follow protests last November, which grew after Pashinyan signed a Russian-brokered peace deal following six weeks of conflict that claimed thousands of lives and saw swathes of territory in and around Nagorno-Karabakh ceded to Azerbaijan. The mountainous region is internationally recognised as Azerbaijan's

land, but has been under the control of ethnic Armenian forces and self-appointed Armenian officials, backed by Armenia, since an earlier war between the rivals concluded in a ceasefire in 1994. The protests had gone dormant for a spell in the depth of Armenia's winter, but first resumed on Saturday, when thousands of demonstrators took to Yerevan's streets.

"Actions of [civil] disobedience need to continue for a long time, the city should be paralysed every once in a while," said Ayk Mamidzhanyan of the Republican Party of Armenia.

YANGON: Protesters gathered near the US Embassy in Yangon despite barriers blocking the way, but left to avoid a confrontation after 20 military trucks with riot police arrived nearby.

Hundreds of thousands of protesters have gathered for mass rallies across Myanmar despite the ruling junta's threat to use lethal force against people who join a general strike against the military's takeover three weeks ago. Tens of thousands gathered near the US Embassy in Yangon on Tuesday despite barriers blocking the way, but left to avoid a confrontation after 20 military trucks with riot police arrived nearby. Protests continued in other parts of the city, including next to Sule Pagoda, a traditional gathering point. Factories, workplaces and shops were shuttered across the country Monday in response to the call for a nationwide strike. The closings extended to the capital,

Naypyitaw. The junta had warned against a general strike in a public announcement Sunday night on state television broadcaster.

"It is found that the protesters have raised their incitement towards riot and anarchy mob on the day of 22 February. Protesters are now inciting the people, especially emotional teenagers and youths, to a confrontation path where they will suffer the loss of life," the onscreen text said in English, replicating the spoken announcement in Burmese. The junta's statement also blamed criminals for past protest violence, with the result that "the security force members had to fire back." Three protesters have been fatally shot. Jakarta denies report it
backs new elections

JAKARTA: Indonesia's foreign ministry on Tuesday denied a report it is devising a plan to hold Myanmar's military junta to its promise of holding new elections. The rebuttal comes as hundreds of people gathered outside the Indonesian embassy in Yangon, the economic capital of Myanmar. Angered by a Reuters report on Monday detailing the plan, the protesters held up placards saying they do not want another election, and that their votes cast in November should be respected. The Reuters report, based on sources familiar with the matter, said Indonesia was pushing its Southeast Asian neighbor to "agree on an action plan over Myanmar's coup" that would uphold the junta's pledge to hold new elections, but stipulated that monitors should be present to ensure they are fair and inclusive. Lei Wah, a 29-year-old office worker protesting outside the embassy in Yangon, told Nikkei Asia she was there because of the report. "The election is already over and the public, including me, accepted the result," she said. Pyae Sone Aung, 23, a student at Myanmar Maritime University, said: "We just came here to protest against holding a [new] election... We just want them to confirm and accept our previous election result and respect our votes, that's why we come here to protest." – Foreign Desk

nationwide protest as a citizen of the country. We must join the protest this time without fail," said 42-year-old Zayar, who owns a bottled water business in the capital. "So I've closed down my factory and joined the demonstration." Zin Mi Mi Aung, a 27-year-old

Thousands of people gathered in the capital's wide boulevards,

many on motorbikes to allow swift movement in the event of any police action.

Reports and photos of protests in at least a dozen cities and towns were posted on social media. Overhead views, some shot from drones, showed massive crowds in six cities appearing to number in the tens of thousands.

There were pictures of a particularly colorful event in Taunggyi, the capital of Shan state, where scores of small red hot-air balloons were set aloft. A bigger one was adorned with a drawing of the three-finger salute adopted by the anti-coup movement. The city is famous for its annual hot-air balloon festival.

In Pinyinna, a satellite town of Naypyitaw, police chased people through the streets to arrest them. Reports on social media, including from worried family members, said police had arrested 200 people or more, mostly young people, and sent them to a military base. If confirmed, it would be the biggest mass arrest since the protests started.

Kuwait to close border in latest restrictions

KUWAIT CITY: Kuwait says it will close its land and sea border crossings from Wednesday until further notice as it imposes curbs to control coronavirus infections in the Gulf nation. Citizens and domestic workers accompanying them are, however, allowed to return through land and sea ports, as are citizens' first-degree relatives, the cabinet said in its meeting on Monday.

The closure will not affect shipping operations and excludes some domestic workers and people employed in the Saudi Arabia-Kuwait neutral zone. The Gulf nation barred the entry of non-citizens on Saturday. The Cabinet also banned dine-in service in restaurants and cafés as part of its latest attempt to curb the spread of the coronavirus, as the tiny oil-rich state reported an upward trend in the number of daily infections over the past few weeks. Earlier this month, Kuwait imposed a new round of restrictions, including a two-week entry ban on non-citizens and a requirement for all travellers to quarantine upon arrival. Immediate relatives of citizens, such as parents and children, and accompanying domestic workers were exempt from the entry ban.

On Monday, the Kuwaiti Health Ministry announced 899 new coronavirus infections, bringing the total number of cases to 184,989. The total number of fatalities due to COVID-19 stands at 1,049.

Georgian police storm opposition party offices

TBILISI: Georgian police have stormed the party offices of opposition leader Nika Melia and detained him days after the prime minister resigned after a disagreement over whether to take the prominent politician into custody. Live television footage showed Melia, the leader of the United National Movement (UNM), the country's main opposition party, being dragged from his party headquarters to be placed in pre-trial detention early on Tuesday. Hundreds of riot police used tear gas against his supporters who camped out in the building, images broadcast by Mtavari TV showed. Dozens of opposition backers were detained. Footage from inside UNM offices published by the Sputnik Georgia media outlet showed Melia barricaded inside a room with some of his supporters, while opposition activists clashed with police on the street.

A Tbilisi court last week ruled to place Melia - who is accused of organising "mass violence" during anti-government protests in 2019 - in pre-trial detention.

"We call on both the representatives of political parties and their supporters to protest in a peaceful manner to refrain from violent actions and not interfere with the court's decision," Sputnik Georgia quoted the interior ministry as saying, referring to the order to have Melia detained. The ministry added in a statement that "police used proportional force and special means" in the police operation.

Suicide bomber strikes near Somali mall

MOGADISHU: A suicide bomber blew himself up near a busy shopping mall and a police station in the Somali capital Mogadishu on Tuesday, officials said, with no casualties as yet confirmed. "A man blew himself up between the Mogadishu Mall and the Hamar Weyne District Police Station in Mogadishu," said Ismail Mukhtar Orjon, spokesman for the Information Ministry. "He exploded while security forces were chasing him after the police identified him as a suspect before the bomb went off." Eyewitness who spoke to Anadolu Agency over the phone said that they saw at least two people wounded.

US sanctions two more Myanmar generals

WASHINGTON: The United States has imposed sanctions on two more generals involved in the February 1 military coup in Myanmar and said it did not rule out additional action after hundreds of thousands took to the streets on Monday despite the threat of violence. The Treasury Department's Office of Foreign Assets Control said on Monday the action was "in response to the security forces' killing of peaceful protesters" after two people were killed over the weekend, and a 23-year-old woman died from her injuries after being shot in the head on February 9. The sanctions penalise Lieutenant General Moe Myint Tun and General Maung Maung Kyaw who are members of the State Administrative Council (SAC), which the military set up to rule the country after seizing power from the elected government of Aung San Suu Kyi.

Armenia committed grave crimes against Azerbaijan's civilians: FM

BAKU: Azerbaijan will take all measures to bring to justice the perpetrators of crimes against Azerbaijanis committed during the First Karabakh War in the early 1990s and the 44-day Second Karabakh War in 2020, Foreign Minister Jeyhun Bayramov said. Bayramov made the remarks in an address to the High-Level Segment of the 46th session of the UN Human Rights Council, which was posted on the website of the Azerbaijani Foreign Ministry. "2021 has been proclaimed as the International Year of Peace and Trust by the relevant UNGA [UN General Assembly] resolution. This year will also be remarkable for Azerbaijan since it enters into the post-conflict recovery and rehabilitation phase following the liberation of its territo-

ries from almost 30-year-old occupation... Series of grave crimes have been committed by Armenia against the civilian population of Azerbaijan, as well as its cultural heritage and infrastructure throughout the years of occupation... Azerbaijan is determined to take all measures stemming from its rights under relevant bilateral and multilateral mechanisms to bring the perpetrators of those crimes to justice," Bayramov said. The minister said that the recent aggression by Armenia which started on 27 September against Azerbaijan was "accompanied by grave violations of international humanitarian law tantamount to war crimes and crimes against humanity in order to seed the panic among the civilian population of Azerbaijan. For this purpose, Armenia deliberately attacked the densely populated civilian settlements of Azerbaijan located



far from the conflict zone, as a result of which 101 civilians were killed more than 400 seriously injured. There have also been undeniable facts depicting a number of human rights violations by Armenian servicemen against Azerbaijani captives, including acts of humiliation and ill-treatment, such as physical assault, verbal abuse, executions through beatings, and ill-treatment of dead bodies". Bayramov added that Armenia in an open attempt to cover-up its above-mentioned wrongdoings brazenly accuses Azerbaijan of

the same with a view to diverting the attention of the international community, and to that end carries out a massive campaign of fake news. UN human rights mechanisms, including the OHCHR, treaty bodies and mandate-holders have also been subjected by Armenia to its fake propaganda. He stressed that having exploited the political settlement process, as well as Azerbaijan's commitment to this process for almost 30 years, Armenia took consistent steps to consolidate the results of occupation of territories of Azerbaijan aiming at their annexation. This included, among others, implantation of settlers into the occupied territories, destruction, pillage and looting of historical and cultural heritage, illegal exploitation of natural resources, misappropriation of private and public property in the seized lands.

The minister noted that the de-occupation of territories of Azerbaijan paves the way for hundreds of thousands of displaced persons to exercise their right to safe and dignified return to their places of origin. "Yet, the unprecedented magnitude of destruction of public and private property, critical civilian infrastructure, including educational and medical facilities, as well as historical and cultural heritage and the environment in the conflict-affected territories places a huge task ahead of the Government of Azerbaijan in terms of rehabilitation and reconstruction of these territories. The Government has already initiated practical steps in order to enable the safe and dignified return of the displaced population and ensure peaceful co-existence within the sovereignty and territorial integrity of Azerbaijan," he underlined.

Malaysia deports 1,086 Myanmar nationals

KUALA LUMPUR: Malaysia has deported 1,086 Myanmar nationals, despite a court order temporarily halting the repatriation amid concerns the group could be at risk if they are returned to military-ruled Myanmar. Kairul Dzamee Daud, director-general of Malaysia's immigration department, said on Tuesday the group had agreed to return voluntarily and were sent back on three ships belonging to Myanmar's navy. The move came hours after the Kuala Lumpur High Court granted an interim stay barring the removal of some 1,200 peo-

ple until 10am (02:00 GMT) on Wednesday. The order was issued in response to a request for a judicial review from Amnesty International and Asylum Access, who said the lives of the people in the group would be at risk and that more than a dozen of the detainees were children with at least one parent in Malaysia. Daud said those sent back were all Myanmar nationals who were detained last year and did not include asylum-seekers or any refugees from the persecuted Rohingya minority. "All of those who have been deported agreed to return of their own free will, without being forced," the immigration chief said in his statement.

Long-serving Saudi oil minister dies at 90

RIYADH: Ahmed Zaki Yamani - a long-serving oil minister in Saudi Arabia who led the kingdom through the 1973 oil crisis and the nationalisation of its state energy company, and later found himself kidnapped by the assassin Carlos the Jackal - has died in London. He was 90. Saudi state television reported his death on Tuesday without mentioning a cause. It said he would be buried in the holy city of Mecca. Known for his Western-style business suits and soft-spoken, measured tones, Yamani helped Saudi Arabia command a dominating presence in the Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) from its birth. The kingdom remains a heavyweight in the group even today and its decisions ripple through the oil in-



Daniel Yergin wrote in his seminal book on the oil industry, The Prize. "His visage, with his large, limpid, seemingly unblinking brown eyes and his clipped, slightly curved Van Dyke beard, became familiar the planet over." Yamani became oil minister in 1962 and would lead the ministry until 1986. He served a crucial role in the nascent oil cartel OPEC as producers around the world began to try to dictate prices to the world market previously dominated by the economic policies of Western nations. Yamani was the first

Saudi representative on OPEC's board of governors in 1961. From his position, he became known for an ever-calm negotiating style that Saudi ministers after him sought to mimic. But that style for an oil kingpin known by the honorific "the Sheikh" would be tested by the times, which included upheaval in the global energy market. That was especially true in the 1973 October War, in which Egypt, Syria, and its allies launched a surprise attack on Israel on the Jewish holy day of Yom Kippur. When the US under President Richard Nixon moved to support Israel, Arab producers in OPEC agreed to cut their supply by 5 percent a month. When Nixon continued his support, the decision gave birth to what would become known as the "oil weapon" - a total embargo on the US and other countries.

Pervaiz Rashid declared ineligible

ISLAMABAD: An election tribunal rejected on Tuesday PML-N leader Pervaiz Rashid's appeal against the rejection of his nomination papers by a returning officer. The verdict was issued by a single-member bench of Justice Shahid Waheed after the arguments in the case had finished. Rashid, who spoke to the media following the verdict, said his lawyers had suggested an appeal could be filed against the decision, but he was "not convinced". "Lawyers say it can be appealed, but I am not convinced. I may not move to seek justice for myself," said the former senator. He added that he was expecting the tribunal to direct him to pay the dues in today's verdict rather than his disqualification. He also alleged that the Punjab House management refused to take payment from him once when he went to pay his dues.

Faisal Vawda allowed to contest in Senate polls

KARACHI: The Sindh High Court election tribunal rejected on Tuesday an appeal against the nomination papers of PTI leader and federal minister Faisal Vawda for the Senate election, declaring him eligible to contest the upcoming polls. The tribunal heard Qadir Khan Mandokhel's appeal against the returning officer's decision to approve Vawda's nomination papers for the Senate elections. The media was barred from covering the hearing. Court staff directed media representatives to leave the courtroom. During the hearing, the tribunal rejected Mandokhel's appeal against Vawda and upheld the PTI leader's nomination. The tribunal said the appellant can file a constitutional petition if he wishes to. Senate tickets being given to Vawda and wealthy construction contractor Saifullah Abro had created a rift among PTI leaders from Sindh. They wrote a letter to Sindh Governor Inam Ismail to express their reservations.

Afghanistan begins vaccination campaign

KABUL: Afghanistan launched its vaccination campaign aimed at inoculating hundreds of thousands, as the war-weary nation reels from near-daily attacks by insurgents. Doctors, security personnel, and journalists were among the first volunteers to receive doses of AstraZeneca's vaccine, donated earlier this month by India. Afghanistan is believed to have been hit hard by the pandemic in the last year, but limited testing and a ramshackle healthcare sector have hampered its ability to track the virus. Officially the country has recorded just 55,600 confirmed cases and about 2,430 deaths.

ISLAMABAD: Chairman of Senate Foreign Affairs Committee, Senator Mushahid Hussain Sayed, has said India has a clear Pakistan policy, in which disinformation and destabilisation are key components, while Pakistan needs clarity in its India policy to respond effectively. He made these remarks at a Conference on 'Disinformation as a Tool of Strategic Warfare' organised by the Institute of Regional Studies. Senator Mushahid Hussain chaired the panel on 'India's Disinformation Campaign against Pakistan and its Impact'. He referred to American scholar Dr Noam Chomsky's landmark study on propaganda, 'Manu-

facturing Consent', where he talks of a nexus between Media Ownership, Advertisers and Media Elites, which act in concert to demoralise the 'enemy'. Senator Mushahid Hussain said that the Indian approach to disinformation is an example of this model, referring also to the tapes of Indian journalist Arnab Goswami and distortions by Indian media of the Senator's own statement on Pulwama. Senator Mushahid Hussain said it was a myth that propaganda was a prerogative of only dictatorships, in fact, democracies like India, Israel and US, too engaged in disinformation and India's propaganda against Pakistan is unique for three reasons. First, it is the only example of a neighbour to wage such system-



atic information warfare against a neighbour in peacetime, belying claims it wants good neighbourly ties. Second, it predates Modi, as this campaign started in 2005. Third, it was the 'largest network ever exposed' of falsehood, lies and disinformation, spread over 750 fake sites, over 10 UN-accredited NGOs, a number of think tanks, using an Indian news agen-

cy, ANI, to disseminate disinformation. The scale and sustained nature of such disinformation is staggering and unprecedented, said the Senator. And the purpose of this multi-million dollar effort was one: 'to discredit Pakistan internationally', as the EU DisinfoLab rightly put it. Senator Mushahid Hussain also quoted from a recent tweet of Indian defence analyst, Pravin Sawhney, who linked India military's withdrawal from the Line of Actual Control with China, to Indian government's desire 'to go back to its chosen enemy -Pakistan' as 'China was distracting the extremists from their core mission'. Given this context, Senator Mushahid Hussain proposed the immediate establishment of a Joint Cyber Inter-Services Com-

mand to play a pivotal role in the emerging threat of an undeclared hybrid war by India against Pakistan. He said, for Pakistan, 'truth is the best weapon' against India, adding that The Economist had a cover story on 'Intolerant India', while The New York Times carried Indian writer Arundhati Roy's article in which she rightly said 'RSS is the State in today's India' and 'an architecture of fascism is being erected in India'. These themes reflect the reality of Modi's India. There was an animated discussion, including questions and comments, and Senator Mushahid Hussain thanked IRS President, Ambassador Nadeem Riyaz, for reviving the IRS as the preeminent Pakistani think tank on India and South Asia.

President stresses enhanced Pak-Uzbek relationship

Certificated Pakistan honey could triple its value: CEN

BEIJING: Certificated Pakistani honey could triple its value, enhancing its export to other countries, says a report published by China Economic Net (CEN) on Tuesday. The report quoting Dr. Muhammad Azeem Khan, Chairman of Pakistan Agricultural Research Council (PARC) stated that their honey is sold for merely USD 20 or USD 25 per kilogram, but the price can rise to USD 100 per kilogram when it is packaged at other countries. The situation could improve if we establish labs and certification systems and implement management and supervision policies. He expressed the urgency of upgrading the Pakistani

honey industry. Meanwhile, the report says, China's honey-producing companies are willing to provide honey production and processing technology to Pakistan, according to Li Dingshun, Chairman of Beijing Aojinda Bee Products Cooperative. This technology is very mature and is recognized by our customers," he added. The honey processing technology is said to feature the honey raw material processing, including honey filtration, sterilization, and temperature control. Li Dingshun illustrated that the honey collected by bees is full in the hive, but it is high in moisture. So we remove the moisture by a honey dryer, in which the honey is put on the upper chamber and the empty container on the

lower chamber. China is the world's largest producer and exporter of honey, he added. In addition, China also has a demand for bee product imports such as propolis. "China's propolis production is too low to satisfy the domestic market demand. We have to export propolis from Brazil, Turkey, and Iran each year. If Pakistan's beekeeping industry can develop rapidly with government support, the raw materials of Pakistani propolis will be very attractive to the Chinese market in the future," commented Yang Rong, president of the China Bee Products Association. "Due to quarantine, the Pakistani honey has to undergo OEM service in Arab countries before exported to Europe and the US," said Zohaib, a Pakistani honey

distributor. According to the National Bank of Pakistan, Pakistan exported 6.351 million US dollars of natural honey from July to November 2020, most of which were exported to Saudi Arabia, reaching 4.275 million tons and accounting for 67% of Pakistan's total honey exports. The lack of honey detection technology will also take a toll on Pakistani beekeepers. "Beekeepers do not have honey testing kits, and Pakistan does not have a laboratory that issues honey testing certificates. When beekeepers export uncertified honey, they may face losses such as seizure," said Nasreen Muzaffar. Ending the OED service and enhancing product value have become tough and urgent issues.
