



Is there any hope at the end of the tunnel?



A midst the monotony of each passing day, the grim tally of killings and the rampant chaos of lawlessness and poor governance appear to have surged exponentially. Pakistan undeniably presents promising business prospects, attracting foreign investors keen to tap into its vast potential. The recent visit of the high-powered Saudi delegation was also part of government initiatives to fetch foreign investments. The foreign investors took appear keen to investing in Pakistan however, their enthusiasm wanes when confronted with daunting law and order challenges and bureaucratic hurdles. The prospect of navigating through a landscape marred by both security concerns and bureaucratic red tape dissuades

potential investors, hampering the country's economic growth. The stability of Pakistan's key alliances, such as those with Saudi Arabia, the UAE, and China, seems to be in a precarious state, given the escalating law and order challenges. China, in particular, is facing a significant dilemma due to its substantial investments in Pakistan, which are now under threat. The recent tragic incident involving the loss of Chinese engineers has compelled China to halt work on several projects, including those under the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC), which has already been experiencing delays. If Pakistan wishes to retain these crucial partnerships, it must urgently address the security concerns of foreign investors.

Effectively tackling security issues necessitates a unified national effort, with all stakeholders aligning their interests. However, Pakistan currently lacks the necessary national cohesion, with state institutions, politicians, and the general public seemingly pursuing divergent agendas. This fragmentation is exacting a heavy toll on the country, particularly affecting the marginalized segments of society. To remedy this situation, Pakistan must foster greater unity and collaboration among its various stakeholders to address security challenges and safeguard the interests of both domestic and foreign investors.

This task can only be effectively achieved by entrusting genuine public representatives with control. However, this does not imply the complete elimination of the Establishment's role. It's an undeniable reality that entrusting all responsibilities solely to politicians may lead to chaos. History has shown that unchecked power often results in mismanagement, paving the way for interventions by the military. The Establishment, possessing both power and expertise, can serve as a vital check on politicians. It can act as a watchdog, intervening when necessary to steer politicians back on course if they veer off track. This balanced approach ensures that public mandates are respected while also maintaining a safeguard against potential deviations from the public interest. When contemplating the future of Chinese and other countries' investments and involvement in Pakistan, a shift in strategy is advised. Rather than solely backing specific individuals, it's imperative for these countries to support the establishment of free and fair elections. Historically, these nations have often thrown their weight behind individuals rather than the broader political system, leading to pitfalls. It's time for a change in approach. Without a transparent system and authentic public representatives, their investments will invariably remain vulnerable. A transformative shift in Pakistan's system can only materialize when its leaders adopt a new mindset. Despite being a nation with limited resources, Pakistan finds itself governed by the affluent, who often cling to power to further enrich themselves. The stark dichotomy between the everyday lives of ordinary Pakistanis and the privileged ruling class is

undeniable. It's imperative to narrow this gap for the betterment of the entire nation. But the question is who will bell the cat?

Pak-Africa ties poised for a quantum leap

Ambassador of Morocco Mohamed Karmoune says African Continental Free Trade Agreement presents an opportunity for Pakistan to reinforce its trade and investment connections with African nations, opening up new possibilities for businesses and strengthening overall economic ties with the continent

ISLAMABAD: Mohamed Karmoune, the Dean of the African Group and Ambassador of Morocco, has expressed his admiration for Pakistan's Look Africa policy. He emphasized that this strategic approach creates a mutually beneficial scenario where both partners stand to gain from each other's expertise and resources. In a special talk about Pakistan-Africa relations, Ambassador Karmoune further said, Pakistan Africa Relations were set by the Bandung Conference 69 years ago. In 1955, Asian and African nations (29 in total) met in Indonesia, from 18 to 24 April, to discuss peace, development, economic cooperation and the role they have to play in the context of Cold War, in conformity with the principles of the UN Charter and International Law. The Bandung Conference, he said, is called now the Non-Aligned

Movement. It is at its 19th summit. The last one was held in Uganda in January 2024 and it brought together 120 member states.

Ambassador Karmoune further said, the change in name has led, of course, to the updating in the objectives, which hovers now around common human problems, shared prosperity, the advance of science and technology, the protection of the environment, food security, reduction of the global warming and response to the ef-



fects of climate change, combatting international terrorism and transnational organized crime. 'In the case of Pakistan and Africa, their relations are based on the principles of mutual respect, cooperation, and solidarity. In the time of the African struggle for independence, Pakistan was among the nations, which actively supported the liberation struggle of the African countries'. He said, in the post-independence of African countries, Pakistan was there by contributing to the continent's peace and security through the participation in the UN peacekeeping cooperation in the Continent. The country has provided more than 200,000 troops to 46 United Nations Peacekeeping Operations, predominantly in Africa.

The Moroccan ambassador said, on the economic level, Africa stands out as a land of immense opportunities. Despite maintaining cordial relations, trade figures between Pakistan and African nations have remained modest, at around \$7 billion. The will to develop it to a high level has been expressed, on the part of Pakistan, by the initiative of "Look Africa" policy launched in 2017. The Initiative aims at opening opportunities for Pakistani enterprises to do business with Africa. This initiative was later incorporated in the overall "Engage Africa" Policy, which has resulted up until now in the organization of four Trade Development Conferences and Single Country Exhibitions in different parts of the Con-

tinent (Nairobi 2020, Lagos 2021, Johannesburg 2022 and Cairo 2024). The objective is to increase the volume of economic exchange with African countries to its maximum potential, he added. In addition to this initiative, the country is negotiating Preferential Trade Agreements with three of the five African economic blocs (SACU, ECOWAS and EAC). Ambassador Karmoune said, African Continental Free Trade Agreement presents an opportunity for Pakistan to reinforce its trade and investment connections with African nations, opening up new possibilities for businesses and strengthening overall economic ties with the continent.

To overcome their common obstacles for developing their economies and forging a strong and effective partnership for peace progress and shared prosperity, Pakistan and Africa need to work together to launch joint ventures in different economic sectors such as Fertilizers (building fertilizer plants in different African regions), Agriculture, ICT, Health, Mines, Inrastructure, Tourisme, Banking, Insurance sector, Car Industry, Renewable energy, vocational and university training 'In line with the Bandung principles, Pakistan and Africa need to maintain unity, solidarity and coordination to make their voice heard in all international and regional platforms'. On the diplomatic level, he said, Pakistan has up until now opened at least 20 embassies across the continent to consolidate its cooperation with the 54 sovereign states and takes it to higher levels. The two regions need to build on the Bandung principles to continue to defend the sovereignty and territorial integrity of all nations, to advocate the settlement of all international disputes by peaceful means, such as negotiation, conciliation, arbitration for the promotion of peace and stability.

In view of the current challenges in the international arena, the objectives and principles of the Bandung spirit remain as relevant today as the time of the founding of the organization. Pakistan and Africa need more coordination to confront emerging threats and challenges which impede efforts to attain greater economic development and social progress. The emergence and spread of pandemics and health emergencies, including



COVID-19, have taught us that there is no country or region which is immune from these threats and that collective efforts are needed to contain them. The dreamed of shared prosperity needs of us to take huge steps in order to enhance economic and social development. Such development can be achieved mainly through science and technology, industrial cooperation and the promotion of trade and investments. On the international level, Pakistan and Africa need to work together to further promote, preserve and reform multilateralism, and push for full respect of the principles of international law and the maintenance of international peace and security, the Ambassador concluded.

UNESCO Proclaims May 5th as World Day of Portuguese Language and Lusophone Cultures

N 2009, fifteen years ago, the date of 5th of May was officially established by the CPLP – the Community of Portuguese Speaking Countries – as the World Day of the Portuguese Language. Ten years later, in 2019, the 40th session of UNESCO General Conference decided to proclaim this day as the World Day of the Portuguese Language and Lusophone Cultures. Speakers of Portuguese are called "Lusophones" (lusófonos).

A neo-Latin language, the Portuguese is one of the most globally diffused languages in modern world. It is native to more than 260 million people in 9 countries covering 4 continents (Portugal in Europe; Brazil in America; East Timor in Asia; Angola, Mozambique, Cape Verde, Guinea-Bissau, S.Tomé and Principe, and Equatorial Guinea, in Africa) making it the most spoken language in the Southern hemisphere.

Each of the nine countries which form CPLP contributes to the development of the language, each one with its own accent, with its own local expressions, with its own culture. Portuguese language is our common language, our common heritage but there remains an enormous space for the development of each Cultures own particularities. Fernando Pessoa, in Portugal; Guimarães Rosa, in Brazil: Mia Couto, in Mozambique: Pepetela, in Angola: Ruy Cinnati, in East Timor; Germano Almeida, in Cape Verde; Alda do Espirito Santo, in S.Tomé e Principe; Abdulai Silá, in GuineaBissau represent a few author's names that illustrate how masterly and innovatively the Portuguese Language can be dealt. Presently, Portuguese is among the

most used languages in international communication, due to its global geographical extension, including, besides the CPLP space, strong historical or diaspora-driven presence in India's Goa, Damão and Diu, China's Macau, Spain's Galiza, in African states as Senegal, Namibia or South Africa, in Latin American countries as Venezuela or Uruguay, in Oceania, as Australia, or in the North America, as the USA and Canada. On the context of the celebration in Pakistan of the 2024 World Day of the Portuguese Language and Lusophone city of Ouro Preto, in the State of Minas Gerais, is coming to Pakistan. It was through the varied seas of this world, starting at the very beginning of 15th century, that the Portuguese Language navigated from its western-European birthplace to varied new locations in all the world's 5 continents. Newspaper industry issues to be addressed amicably: Tarar

Minister was requested that the regional quota be implemented; ads should be released to APNS members only

ISLAMABAD: The Federal Government firmly stands for the promotion of print media and the issues confronted by newspapers will be amicably addressed," stated Mr. Attaullah Tarar, the Federal Minister for Information & Broadcasting.

Mr. Tarar was addressing a meeting of the Executive Committee of the All-Pakistan Newspapers Society at Islamabad chaired by its President Ms. Nazafreen Saigol Lakhani, Mr. Sarmad Ali, Secretary General APNS welcomed the Minister and apprised him about the problems being faced by the print media. These included long pending notification of 35% increase in the government advertisement rates approved by the Prime Minister in his last tenure.

He reminded that the Prime Minister during his last meeting with APNS office bearers had given an assurance that an amount of Rs. 50 crore will be released to newspapers before Eid as initial payment of outstanding dues of the print media against advertising released by the federal government. However, the print media was paid Rs 4.6 crores only. The APNS office bearers also explained the hardship faced by members in getting renewal of their registration by the Press Registrar office due to a highly complicated procedure practiced by the Press Registrar and requested that the procedure be made hassle free and that the registration be made one time as stipulated in the law. The APNS members requested that the regional quota be implemented in letter and spirit and no publications other than regional newspapers be given advertisements from this quota. They also requested that in the forthcoming budget GST, custom and import duties on imports of newspaper consumables like ink and printing plates be exempted. Mr. Atta Ullah Tarrar assured that the issues being faced by the newspaper industry will be addressed to the satisfac-



tion of the print media's. He stated that he would take up the issue of increase in the government advertisement rates with the Finance Ministry for its incorporation in the next fiscal budget. He reiterated that the Ministry of Information had disbursed an overall amount of Rs.1.3 billion to media outlets before Eid. He stated that he has asked the ministry to evolve a mechanism for future budgetary arrangements for payment of advertisement expenses. He assured that the old liabilities will be cleared in the first quarter of next financial year. Mr. Tarrar proposed a joint committee of Information Ministry and APNS to evolve a system for registration of newspapers. He stated that the newspapers played a pivotal role in countering fake news and disinformation. In order to promote newspaper readership, the Federal Minister stated that he would ask the Information Ministry to suggest to the Ministry of Aviation and other government ministries and departments to subscribe to newspapers as in the past. ISLAMABAD: Ambassador of France to Pakistan Niclas Galey has said women's empowerment and gender equality are priorities of French foreign policy, which includes an ambitious "feminist diplomacy. 'Today we have a perfect demonstration of this convergence with this series of "inspiring stories" - short videos which highlight the contribution of four French companies to the promotion of women's empowerment in Pakistan'. Ambassador of France made these remarks during a ceremony held to honour the contribution of French companies in Pakistan to women empowerment and corporate social responsibility. While giving the background of the project, he said it was launched by four French companies and the Embassy - namely L'Oréal, Schneider, IPSOS and Servier.

Sustainable Development Goals by creating employment, building skills, giving opportunities and reducing poverty and inequalities, and we are convinced that, in this regard, French investors abroad have duties and responsibilities in their host countries'. For their activities have both a systemic impact though the promotion of values and standards, but also an impact on individuals – and this exactly what these short videos are about, as you will see in a few minutes, he added. He said he was very happy and proud that French companies in Pakistan developed good practices in terms of governance, gender equality and human rights, as well as working relations and conditions, environment, and local development.

He mentioned about a legislation adopted in France in 2019 to include consideration of social and environmental issues in the management of French companies. And as far as public and government policies are concerned, all our international development and cooperation projects must now systematically integrate actions related to women's rights and gender equality, as well as climate change issues.

The ambassador was of the view, the initiative that brought them together was also an opportunity to highlight that the French economic presence in Pakistan - 20 subsidiaries, 1.2 billion Euros of investments - was beneficial not only to the economy of this country but also to its people, and to show that these companies, apart from the business perspectives, actively participate and locally contribute to the development of Pakistan. 'Also, in some particularly tragic moments, like the floods of summer 2022, French companies demonstrated their solidarity and their involvement in the Pakistani social and economic fabric by helping local communities, directly or through funding of NGOs, some of them represented here'. Despite difficult economic conditions for all businesses in Pakistan during the recent years, these NGOs have not given up on this essential part of identity, which is to be more than a business - a responsible actor in the Pakistani society.

Poland concerned over civilian causalities in Gaza: ambassador

Pak-Poland trade volume satisfactory: needs to be further enhanced: Maciei Pisarski

ISLAMABAD: "The Polish Ambassador to Pakistan. Maciei Pisarski has said that the relations between Pakistan and Poland are based on solid foundations. 'We are working with Pakistani partners in the development sector, and the volume of bilateral trade between the two countries stands at 930 million dollars, with the potential to increase to \$1 billion'. 30% of Pakistan's exports go to Europe through Poland. Polish gas company is providing Pakistani gas to Pakistani consumers, and Polish companies are playing a role in addressing Pakistan's energy crisis. Polish oil and gas company is working in Sindh. The ambassador said, thirty Polish pilots and instructors had come to Pakistan to enhance the capacity of the Pakistan Air Force after independence of Pakistan. The Polish Ambassador expressed these views while addressing a meet the press at the National Press Club, where he was invited by the club's office bearers.

The ambassador said, the relations between Pakistan and Poland are based on solid foundations, and both countries have trade, cultural, and other ties. The trade volume between the two countries is near \$1 billion, with the potential to increase to \$1 billion. 'My priority is to



strengthen the relations between the two countries, and we are working to address Pakistan's energy crisis through Polish companies'. We have established a vocational school in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and a complete project for women in Hunza, which has been named "Safe Space". 30% of Pakistan's imports go to Europe through Poland, and Polish investment is present in Sindh and other provinces. There are friendly and close relations between Poland and Pakistan, and economic cooperation is the center of our relations. Despite the distance, both countries have economic, political. and public ties. The Polish Ambassador further said that Pakistan is affected by environmental changes, and Polish companies are expert in green technology. Recently, Polish companies showcased their expertise in green technology at an exhibition in Lahore. He clarified that the Polish embassy does not charge any fees for interviews and appointments. Those who demand money are fraudsters, and there is a fake website of the Polish embassy which has my picture on it. Poland is a champion of human rights and follows the UN Charter, and we are providing humanitarian aid in Gaza. Polish individuals are working as volunteers in Gaza, and Poland has recognized the resolution for the establishment of an independent state. He said while Israel had a right to defend itself, killing of civilians in the ongoing war was indeed a source of concern for Poland. 'Palestine has an embassy in

Poland. However, we are in a sensitive and tense environment, and we are facing a war on our border. Russia is killing civilians in Ukraine every day', he concluded.

Reports indicate that self-proclaimed 'muftis' in Pakistan, some based in Islamabad, have initiated public appeals urging individuals to adopt orphaned children from Gaza. These individuals have even established WhatsApp groups to solicit consent from potential adoptive parents

ISLAMABAD: In the midst of the Gaza crisis, a disturbing scandal has emerged in Pakistan, particularly in Islamabad. Certain unscrupulous individuals are exploiting the tragedy in Gaza for their own selfish gain. Reports indicate that self-proclaimed 'muftis' in Pakistan, some based in Islamabad, have initiated public appeals urging individuals to adopt orphaned children from Gaza. These individuals have even established WhatsApp groups to solicit consent from potential adoptive parents. Investigations have uncovered that these individuals are not only soliciting money from families interested in adoption but also disappearing once they receive payment. This exploitation of a humanitarian crisis for financial gain is deeply concerning." When contacted, the Ambassador of Palestine to Pakistan Ahmed Rabei made it clear that not even a single child had come to Pakistan from Gaza. 'This is not true. There is no orphaned child from Palestine, and no child will come from Palestine', the ambassador added. He reiterated that it's highly improbable for orphan children to enter Pakistan without the awareness of the Palestine embassy in Islamabad. The ambassador urged Pakistani citizens to remain vigilant against such deceptive tactics and not to succumb to their schemes. Similar elements similarly took advantage of the situation following the devastating earthquake that struck Pakistan in 2005. Certain individuals and organizations shamelessly established fraudulent charities, purportedly to aid in earthquake relief efforts. However, rather than directing the donations towards assisting the victims, these deceitful entities shamelessly diverted the funds for their personal enrichment. - DNA


Uzbek Ambassador Oybek Arif Usmanov calls on FPCCI President Atif Ikram Sheikh




Khalid's works were bold, bright, and expressed explosive movement. Layers of liquid enamel formed a shifting surface that appeared to be in
