

Pakistan's foreign office faces mounting criticism



ISLAMABAD: Pakistan's Foreign Office (FO), the institution tasked with representing the country's image abroad, is facing growing criticism from diplomats and foreign missions stationed in Islamabad. Concerns have been raised over inefficiency, lack of cooperation, slow pace of work, and recurring corruption scandals that have tarnished the reputation of the office. Diplomats from several countries have expressed dissatisfaction with the way the Foreign Office handles routine matters. According to officials, the FO often demonstrates a lack of interest in resolving issues promptly, leading to delays in communication and coordination. This slow pace of work has become a source of frustration for foreign missions, who expect efficiency and professionalism in their dealings with Pakistan's premier diplomatic institution. One of the most pressing grievances voiced by diplomats relates to Goods and Services Tax (GST) refunds. Diplomats argue that while in their home countries such refunds are processed swiftly, in Pakistan the process is either delayed indefinitely or not honored at all. This issue has become a major source of contention, with foreign missions repeatedly raising the matter with the authorities. The lack of resolution not only inconveniences diplomats but also reflects poorly on Pakistan's commitment to international norms and diplomatic privileges. Adding to the discontent is the recent corruption scandal in the attestation department of the Foreign Office. Reports suggest that malpractice in this department has been ongoing for years, with officials allegedly demanding bribes to expedite routine attestation services. Such practices have eroded trust and created a perception of systemic corruption within the institution. The attestation scandal is not the first time the Foreign Office has been embroiled in controversy. In the past, corruption was reported in the allocation of liquor quota permits for foreign missions, as well as in the import of vehicles under diplomatic privileges. These scandals led to disciplinary actions, with some FO officials being dismissed from service. In certain cases, even diplomats themselves were sacked for their involvement in corrupt practices. The Foreign Office is often described as the "face of Pakistan" to the outside world. Its role in facilitating diplomatic relations, ensuring smooth communication, and projecting a positive image of the country is critical. However, recurring inefficiency and corruption have undermined this role, creating a negative impression among foreign missions. Diplomats argue that if Pakistan wishes to strengthen its global standing, the FO must operate as a model institution efficient, transparent, and corruption-free. The dissatisfaction of foreign missions carries significant consequences. Diplomats are not only representatives of their countries but also key stakeholders in fostering bilateral relations. Their negative experiences with Pakistan's Foreign Office risk influencing their governments' perception of Pakistan. This, in turn, could affect cooperation in areas such as trade, investment, and cultural exchange. A tarnished image of the FO reflects directly on Pakistan's credibility in the international community. Observers believe that the Foreign Office must urgently address these issues to restore confidence. Reforms aimed at improving efficiency, ensuring transparency, and eliminating corruption are seen as essential. Despite the challenges, there is hope that better sense will prevail and the Foreign Office will set its house in order. Pakistan's leadership has often emphasized the importance of diplomacy in advancing national interests. To achieve this, the FO must embody professionalism and integrity. The criticism directed at Pakistan's Foreign Office serves as a wake-up call. Diplomats and foreign missions expect efficiency, cooperation, and respect for international norms. The persistence of inefficiency and corruption not only inconveniences them but also damages Pakistan's global image.

Exclusive Interview with Dr Ramez Alraee,
the Ambassador of Syria to Pakistan

1: Your Excellency, thank you for speaking with us. Syria is often described as the cradle of human civilization. How do you explain this unique identity to the world?

Thank you for having me. Indeed, Syria is not just a country; it is a living archive of human history. Cities such as Damascus and Aleppo are among the oldest continuously inhabited cities in the world, with histories spanning over 11,000 years. Syria has hosted dozens of civilizations – Roman, Greek, Byzantine, Islamic, Umayyad, Ayyubid, and many others. Each left behind its architectural, cultural, and linguistic imprints. This deep heritage is why we proudly call Syria the cradle of civilization. “Syria is a museum under the open sky.”



2: Damascus is highlighted as one of the oldest cities in human history. What makes it so special?

Damascus is often described as a city where time folds in on itself – layers of civilizations stitched together in stone, wood, and light. Designated a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 1979, its Old City holds more than 125 archaeological landmarks within walls that have witnessed Aramean, Roman, Byzantine, and Islamic eras. Step through one of its ancient gates and you pass from modern bustle to a living museum of streets, courtyards, minarets, and markets. At the heart stands the Umayyad Mosque, a masterpiece of early Islamic architecture. Its vast marble courtyard gleams under the sun; golden and emerald mosaics portray paradisal gardens; and within lies the



revered shrine associated with John the Baptist (Prophet Yahya). Nearby rests the mausoleum of Salah ad-Din (Saladin), a reminder of Damascus's role on the world stage. The mosque is not merely a monument—it is a breathing center of worship, scholarship, and community life. Radiating from this core are souqs that have hummed for centuries. Hamidiyah Market stretches like a river of sound beneath a perforated iron canopy: the rhythm of cobblers' hammers, the call of spice merchants, the perfume of cardamom, sumac, and rose. Under its archways, you'll find hand-beaten copper, Damascene inlay, silk brocade, and the famed pistachio-rolled ice cream at Bakdash. Caravanserais such as Khan As'ad Pasha still stand, their domed halls once sheltering traders from Aleppo, Baghdad, and beyond.

The palatial Al-Azm complex, once home to Ottoman governors, captures Damascene domestic elegance: ablaq stonework in alternating light and dark, carved wooden ceilings, latticed mashrabiya screens, and courtyard fountains ringed with jasmine. Traditional houses turn inward, around cool, shaded patios where citrus trees and water basins temper the desert heat—architecture as climate wisdom and social fabric. Churches and chapels, such as those along the Straight Street (Via Recta) and the Chapel of St. Ananias, speak to the city's deep Christian heritage; old quarters like Bab Touma and Bab Sharqi keep distinct identities while blending into the whole. From the slopes of Mount Qasioun, the city unfurls in a tapestry of roofs and minarets, with the Barada River and the orchards of the Ghouta plain historically feeding Damascus's gardens and kitchens.

Food here is culture made edible: herb-

laced fattoush, kibbeh in countless regional forms, trays of ma'amoul dusted in sugar, and coffee scented with cardamom—rituals of hospitality that have survived every century's turn.

Damascus has endured earthquakes, empire shifts, and modern conflict. Yet restoration efforts, the resilience of craftspeople, and the continuity of worship and trade have kept its soul remarkably intact. The Old City is not a relic behind glass; it is a lived-in palimpsest where shopkeepers inherit their stalls, families their courtyards, and artisans their tools and secrets. This is why Damascus feels timeless: its past is not past at all, but present—spoken through stone arcades, whispered in jasmine-scented evenings, and echoed in the rhythms of its markets and prayers.

3: Syria's other cities, such as Aleppo and Homs, are also historically significant. Could you elaborate?

Aleppo's story stretches to the second millennium BC, layered with Hittite, Hellenistic, Roman, Byzantine, and Islamic legacies. Crowned by its hilltop Citadel—an Ayyubid-Mamluk masterpiece with a monumental bent entrance, bridge, and gatehouse—the city radiates through quarters once lined by khans, hammams, and the vaulted Souq al-Madina.

The Great Mosque of Aleppo, caravanserais like Khan al-Wazir, and delicate stone façades attest to a mercantile metropolis on the Silk Road. Despite the scars of recent conflict, conservation has revived alleys, workshops, and spice-laden stalls, restoring the cadence of a city long renowned for craft, cuisine, and music. Homs, by contrast, is a crossroads of Syria's religious and ethnic mosaic.

Its skyline is marked by the Mosque of Khalid ibn al-Walid, whose twin minarets and domed sanctuary house the revered companion's shrine, drawing pilgrims and

students alike. Westward rises Krak des Chevaliers (Qal'at al-Hosn), a UNESCO-listed crusader stronghold commanding the Homs Gap. With concentric walls, arrow slits, and a formidable donjon, it is a textbook of medieval military architecture, later adapted by Mamluk hands. Together, Aleppo and Homs embody Syria's endurance: urban centers where markets, mosques, churches, and fortresses narrate a civilization that survives, restores, and remembers. Their stones hold memory and meaning.

4: Palmyra holds special importance. How would you describe its global relevance?

Palmyra is a world treasure. Located in the heart of the Syrian desert, it served as a major caravan stop between East and West from 44 BC to 272 AD. Its Roman temples, the Great Colonnaded Street, the theater, tombs, and the famous Fakhr al-Din al-Maani Castle have made it a UNESCO World Heritage Site since 1980. Palmyra is a testimony to the grandeur of ancient Syrian civilization.

5: Syria is home to remarkable religious sites, both Islamic and Christian. How important is this aspect?

Our religious heritage is a symbol of coexistence. The Umayyad Mosque in Damascus stands not only as an architectural masterpiece but also as a cultural symbol where different faiths intersect. Nearby is the shrine of Sayyida Ruqayyah. A few kilometers away lies the revered shrine of Sayyida Zainab, visited by hundreds of thousands of pilgrims from Pakistan, Iran, Iraq, India, and beyond. Christians also find deep roots in Syria. From the Church of Saint Simon the Styliste and the ancient monasteries of Maaloula and Saydnaya, to the earliest-known house-church of Dura-Europos — Syria is integral to early Christian history.

6: How do you evaluate Syria's relationship with Pakistan?

By facilitating easier travel, encouraging cultural exchanges, and deepening academic cooperation, Syria and Pakistan are laying the groundwork for a future of even closer partnership. Together, we aspire to build bridges of understanding, prosperity, and solidarity that will serve generations to come.

7: What message would you like to convey to Pakistani tourists, students, and researchers?

I warmly invite the people of Pakistan to visit Syria—a land where every stone speaks history, and every city tells a timeless story. Syria is not only a country of resilience, but also a cradle of civilizations, faith, and culture.

From the ancient streets of Damascus,

the world's oldest continuously inhabited capital, to the majestic ruins of Aleppo, from the legendary temples of Palmyra to the serene waters of Hama, Syria offers a journey through centuries of human achievement. The coastal charm of Tartus and Latakia, the spiritual depth of Suwayda, the vibrant heritage of Homs, and the historical richness of Deir ez-Zor together form a mosaic of experiences awaiting discovery.

Syria today is rebuilding and revitalizing its heritage. Our monuments, mosques, churches, and archaeological treasures are being restored with care, ensuring that visitors can witness both the grandeur of the past and the promise of renewal.

Answer: To begin, I would like to point out that the Syrian Arab Republic has suffered in recent years from a deteriorating economic situation that was unsuitable for the Syrian state and the Syrian people due to previous economic sanctions. However, by the end of last year and the start of the new year, the new Syrian leadership began to take action in various fields, particularly at the international level, to lift the sanctions on Syria. 9 : How will the “NASTEX 2026” exhibition serve as a valuable platform for Pakistan’s textile and industrial sector to enhance cooperation between the two sides?

Answer: As I mentioned earlier, this exhibition to be held in Damascus is one of the most important economic and industrial events that will take place at the Damascus Fairgrounds, and it will enjoy international participation. Since Syria is a global leader in the textile sector, and likewise Pakistan is also a leader in textile manufacturing, this represents a major opportunity for Pakistani participation in the exhibition. It will enable direct engagement with Syrian institutions, companies, and businessmen, which will positively contribute to developing economic and trade relations between Syria and Pakistan across various sectors, foremost among them cooperation in textile industries and other related activities and events. Therefore,

we once again warmly welcome our brothers in Pakistan—textile companies, businessmen, and various entities—to participate in this exhibition.

10: Your concluding remarks?

Syria is a nation that has stood the test of time. For thousands of years, it has endured wars, invasions, and natural challenges, yet it continues to rise with dignity and strength. The true power of Syria lies not only in its ancient monuments and historic cities, but in its people—a community bound by culture, faith, and

Independence Day of Kuwait

The State of Kuwait celebrated its 65th National Day (often referred to as Independence Day) and the 35th anniversary of Liberation Day. Notes to this effect were signed and exchanged between H.E. Mr. AKAMATSU Shuichi, Ambassador of Japan to Pakistan and Mr. Muhammad Humair Karim, Secretary of the Ministry of Economic Affairs, in Islamabad on January 13th, 2026. Subsequently, Grant Agreement was also signed and exchanged between Mr. MIYATA Naoaki, Chief Representative of JICA Pakistan Office and Mr. Miran Mohiyuddin Soomro, Senior Joint Secretary of the Ministry of Economic Affairs.

In this project, a new child health care facility will be constructed at Children Hospital Multan which is a public medical institution serving as the regional hub hospital in Multan district. The objective of the project is to strengthen the diagnostic and treatment systems in the Children's Hospital and the Institute of Child Health Multan. This project also seeks to improve its function as a specialized tertiary care hospital and a disaster response hub hospital in the region through the expansion of the facility and the provision of medical equipment. These improvements are necessary to provide the healthcare services



for high-risk neonates, infants and children with serious illness or injuries. This project will contribute to improving the quality of healthcare services for children in south Punjab and neighboring provinces.

ICCI President, Malaysian High Commissioner vow to enhance bilateral trade volume to \$3-4 billion

ISLAMABAD: Dato Muhammad Azhar Mazlan, the Malaysian High Commissioner to Pakistan, has emphasized the importance of further strengthening Pakistan–Malaysia economic relations by expanding cooperation in trade, investment, and people-to-people linkages, particularly in emerging and high-potential sectors. He expressed these views during a meeting with a delegation of the Islamabad Chamber of Commerce and Industry (ICCI), headed by its President Sardar Tahir Mehmood, which held a meeting with the High Commissioner at the Malaysian High Commission here on Monday. The ICCI delegation comprised Senior Vice President Tahir Ayub, Vice President Irfan Chaudhry, and Convener ICCI Standing Committee on ASEAN, Chaudhry Mohammad Ali. The Malaysian High Commissioner appreciated the proactive role of ICCI in promoting business-to-business engagement and reaffirmed Malaysia's strong commitment to deepening economic collaboration with Pakistan. He said Malaysia attaches great importance to Pakistan as a key economic partner and stressed the need for enhanced interaction between the private sectors of both countries. He also agreed to visit ICCI at the earliest to hold direct interaction with the business community of Islamabad. Both the sides agreed to undertake collaborative efforts to enhance the bilateral trade volume to \$3 to 4 billion. Speaking on the occasion, President ICCI Sardar Tahir Mehmood highlighted the longstanding and cordial bilateral relations between Pakistan and Malaysia. He acknowledged Malaysia's significant commercial presence in Pakistan, particularly in palm oil, telecom, education, and the halal sector. However, he pointed out that despite strong ties, the trade balance remains tilted, underscoring the need to diversify Pakistan's exports toward value-added goods and services. The ICCI President identified the halal industry as a key area for immediate collaboration, proposing joint halal certification standards, establishment of halal parks, food processing facilities, and expansion of meat exports. He further stressed cooperation in the IT and digital economy, real estate, low-cost housing. He highlighted the importance of joint ventures for value addition in the agriculture sector and proposed structured B2B matchmaking between Pakistani and Malaysian companies to accelerate partnerships.



Senior Vice President ICCI Tahir Ayub underscored the need to enhance agro-based exports, particularly mangoes, citrus fruits and other high-value produce—through greater focus on value addition, stating that such measures would not only boost export earnings but also generate mutual benefits for the business communities and people of both countries. Vice President ICCI Irfan Chaudhry stressed that stronger institutional linkages and regular business exchanges would help translate goodwill into tangible economic outcomes. ICCI delegation proposed organizing a Pakistan–Malaysia Business Forum in Kuala Lumpur and holding sector-specific virtual B2B meetings as effective trade promotion mechanisms. It also proposed signing a Memorandum of Understanding between ICCI and relevant Malaysian chambers and establishing a joint working group to ensure effective follow-up and implementation. Both sides agreed to work closely to convert discussions into concrete trade and investment opportunities and encouraged Malaysian entrepreneurs to get registered as ICCI members. The ICCI delegation formally invited the Malaysian High Commissioner to visit ICCI and engage directly with the business community of Islamabad. Convener ICCI Standing Committee on ASEAN, Chaudhry Mohammad Ali also shared his insights on occasion.

Ali Farid Khwaja appointed as the SECP commissioner

ISLAMABAD: The Federal Government of Pakistan has appointed Mr. Muhammad Ali Farid Khwaja as Commissioner of the Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan (SECP) for a three-year term, effective immediately. The announcement comes via a notice from the Finance Division's Investment Wing. His remuneration and allowances will be governed by the relevant provisions of the SECP Act.

This appointment brings a seasoned private-sector leader to one of Pakistan's key financial regulatory bodies. Mr. Khwaja, a prominent Pakistani-British financier, investor, and entrepreneur, specializes in fintech, capital markets, and investment strategy. He is best known as the Co-founder and Chairman of KTrade Securities (formerly associated with KASB Securities), widely regarded as Pakistan's largest retail investment and trading platform. Under his leadership, KTrade has driven innovation in accessible stock trading, digital onboarding, and partnerships that have expanded financial inclusion, including collaborations

with fintech players like JazzCash.

With over 15 years of experience in equity research and investments, Mr. Khwaja previously served as a Partner at Autonomous Research in London (now part of AllianceBernstein), focusing on European fintech equities. He also held roles as CFO and Board Director at Safe Charge Group (a London-listed payments firm) and was a top-ranked technology analyst at firms like Berenberg and UBS. An alumnus of the University of Oxford (as a Rhodes Scholar) and Georgetown Leadership Seminar, he has been recognized for his contributions to Pakistan's financial sector, including receiving the Pride of Pakistan award.

The move is seen as timely amid efforts to modernize Pakistan's capital markets. Recent SECP developments include the appointment of Dr. Kabir Ahmed Sidhu as Chairman earlier in January 2026, signaling a push toward stronger governance, market supervision, and reforms in areas like digitalization and investor protection. Industry observers, including former regulators and market participants, have welcomed Mr. Khwaja's entry, noting his "real

He informed that talks are in the final stages with the Karachi Port authorities to sign a Memo-

Ambassador Stoinescu emphasized the importance of Romania-Pakistan IT Forum as a platform to promote digital cooperation, joint ventures, innovation, and knowledge exchange between technology sectors of both countries. 

The people of Pakistan across the globe observe Kashmir Solidarity Day to reaffirm our unwavering moral, diplomatic and political support for our Kashmiri brothers and sisters in their just cause to achieve the right to self-determination as enshrined in the relevant United Nations Security Council resolutions. It was Shahid Mohtarma Benazir Bhutto who began the observance of this day 36 years ago following the historic uprising of the Kashmiri people in 1989, a struggle that continues to this day.

For nearly eight decades, the valiant Kashmiri people have stood tall against the illegal Indian occupation and have rendered countless sacrifices. On this day, we pay solemn tribute to their indomitable spirit and resilience.

The situation in Indian Illegally Occupied Jammu and Kashmir (IOJUK) remains a matter of grave concern for global conscience. Since the illegal and unilateral actions of 5th August 2019, India has intensified its efforts to consolidate its occupation through administrative and legislative manipulation. By muzzle the media, isolating the Kashmiri people and attempting to dilute the Muslim majority through demographic changes, India seeks to disempower the Kashmiri people in their own land.

Indian occupation forces also continue to commit countless human rights violations in IOJUK. The findings of recent international reports highlight the systematic and arbitrary nature of punishment. The use of punitive house demolitions and the ongoing suppression of digital freedoms, including the blocking of thousands of social media accounts, are clear attempts to hide the reality in IOJK.

The recent profiling of mosques and Islamic madrasahs committed in IOJUK constitutes deliberate intimidation by the Indian authorities, aimed to obstruct the free exercise of religion by the Muslim majority population. Such actions form part of a broader pattern of religious persecution under the extremist Hindutva framework. The Indian government has denied the inalienable right to practice their religion without fear, coercion or discrimination.

The dangerous military escalation initiated by India in May 2025 serves as a stark reminder that true and durable peace in South Asia remains impossible unless the core dispute of Jammu and Kashmir is resolved.

I urge the international community to move beyond mere expressions of concern for the Kashmiri people and persuade India to stop the human rights violations in IOJUK, allow unfettered access to international human rights observers and grant the Kashmiri people their promised right to self-determination.

On this day, I reiterate that we will continue to stand shoulder-to-shoulder with the Kashmiri people until they realize their right to decide their own future through a free and impartial plebiscite.

Pakistan stands with Kashmiris in their struggle for freedom.

Every year, 5th February is observed as Kashmir Solidarity Day, an occasion where the people and the Government of Pakistan reaffirm their unwavering support for their Kashmir brothers and sisters in their just struggle for the realization of their right to self-determination.

The Jammu and Kashmir dispute remains one of the oldest unresolved disputes on the map of the United Nations. Over several United Nations Security Council resolutions have been established, beyond doubt, the disputed status of the territory of Jammu and Kashmir was preserved and its final disposition must be made in accordance with the will of the Kashmiri people, expressed through a fair and impartial plebiscite. However, for nearly eight decades, the Kashmiri people have been denied this fundamental right, due to India's intransigence.

Even after decades of bloodshed, brutality and barbarity, the Indian Illegally Occupied Jammu and Kashmir (IOJUK) remains a hotbed of ethnic and religious minorities, heavy militarization, total repression and egregious human rights violations. Arbitrary political detentions, suppression of genuine political activity and severe restrictions on media, have become routine instruments to silence dissent in IOJK.

On 5th August 2019, India took a host of illegal and unilateral administrative and legal measures, in an attempt to consolidate its illegal occupation of IOJK. These measures not only violated the UN Charter but completely defied the relevant UN Security Council resolutions and the Fourth Geneva Convention. Such hollow attempts by India to carry out demographic re-engineering, or to impose a new administrative structure in Kashmir, cannot absolve it from its international commitments and obligations, nor could they diminish the inalienable rights of the Kashmiri people.

India's illegal actions in IOJK are driven by Hindutva ideology that seeks to normalize discrimination, curtail religious freedoms and criminalize dissent. The ongoing profiling of mosques and their management committees in IOJK results in a grave violation of the right to freedom of religion and highlights the discrimination faced by the Muslim population. Regrettably, the Indian occupation has moved beyond military repression to ideological coercion, aimed at silencing dissent and oppressing the entire people.

Despite enduring decades of oppression, the brave and valiant Kashmiri people, refuse to surrender their legitimate aspirations, courage, and sacrifices.

As Prime Minister of Pakistan, I have been a strong advocate for the right to self-determination of the Kashmiri people at every international forum including the United Nations General Assembly.

On this Kashmir Solidarity Day, I measure my Kashmiri brothers and sisters that Pakistan stands with them in their just struggle for diplomatic and political support to the Kashmir freedom struggle, until the Kashmiri people succeed in attaining their right to self-determination through a free and impartial plebiscite as promised to them under the auspices of the United Nations.

Inshallah, the days of darkness shall give way to the dawn of freedom and justice. The time is not far, when the people of Jammu and Kashmir shall break the shackles of Indian occupation and live their lives in a future free from fear.

As we observe the Kashmir Solidarity Day today, Pakistan reiterates its firm and unwavering support for the people of Jammu and Kashmir in their just struggle for self-determination. Under illegal Indian occupation, the Kashmiri people remain deprived of their fundamental rights. Yet, their resilience qualifies the legitimacy of their just cause.

All the heart of the Jammu and Kashmir dispute lies India's failure to implement the United Nations Security Council resolutions guaranteeing the Kashmiri people's right to self-determination. India's persistent defiance undermines the United Nations Charter, the relevant United Nations Security Council resolutions and the Fourth Geneva Convention.

The situation on the ground in Indian Illegally Occupied Jammu and Kashmir (IOJK) has moved beyond episodic violations to a sustained system of repression. Since the unilateral and illegal actions of 5th August 2019, India has dismantled legal safeguards, weakened local institutions, and imposed new measures aimed at consolidating its permanent occupation of the disputed territory, including artificially altering the demographic composition to change Muslim majority into minority, forcing media to follow the official line, and criminalizing any form of dissent. Under the Hindutva-driven framework, people in IOJK face constant discrimination. The recent profiling of mosques in IOJK, where women and children are forced to give their personal details, photographs and sectarian affiliations show the extent of institutionalized Islamophobia.

Grave human rights violations including fake encounters, enforced disappearances, arbitrary detentions and restrictions on fundamental freedoms continue unabated. UN experts have recently noted the military detention of nearly 200 individuals, including journalists, students, and human rights defenders.

We urge the international community to take decisive actions to address the worsening situation and stop the illegal and unilateral actions, persuade India to implement the United Nations Security Council resolutions and allow the Kashmiri people to exercise their promised right to self-determination.

Pakistan will continue to stand with our Kashmiri brothers and sisters morally and diplomatically. Our efforts will remain focused on securing a peaceful and lasting resolution of the Jammu and Kashmir dispute.

On 5th February every year, the people of Pakistan come together to stand firmly in solidarity with our Kashmiri brothers and sisters. We reaffirm our unwavering support for their legitimate struggle to achieve the right to self-determination, as enshrined in the relevant United Nations Security Council resolutions.

The Jammu and Kashmir dispute is one of the oldest disputes in the world and has been on the agenda of the United Nations Security Council since 1948. 

Aga Khan University Graduates Over 400 Students and Installs Princess Zahra Aga Khan as Pro-Chancellor

KARACHI: The Aga Khan University graduated 461 students from 18 degree programmes at its 38th Convocation in Pakistan and formally installed Princess Zahra Aga Khan as the University's first Pro-Chancellor. As Pro-Chancellor, Princess Zahra will guide AKU in its continuing efforts to improve quality of life.

In his message, AKU's Chancellor, His Highness the Aga Khan, noted that the Aga Khan University and its graduates carry "both an extraordinary responsibility and an extraordinary opportunity: to create, to disseminate, and to apply knowledge in ways that improve the quality of human life." This year saw the graduation of the first cohort from the Institute for Educational Development's Bachelor of Education programme.

The programme offers a rigorous blend of academic and field-based learning that prepares graduates to teach effectively in diverse school contexts.

"The University's geographic expansion has seen AKU's presence expand across Pakistan, into more cities and villages than ever before," said AKU's Pro-Chancellor, Princess Zahra Aga Khan. "From Karachi to Matiari, from Lahore to Gilgit, the University's health care professionals, educators, and researchers are part

of the fabric of people's lives."

The Aga Khan University continues to address Pakistan's critical development challenges through a commitment to access and excellence. With nearly 70 percent of the graduating class being women, the University is actively addressing the gender gap in a country where millions of girls remain out of school.

Valedictorian Muhammad Taha Nasim thanked AKU's faculty, noting how they challenged graduates to "reach our highest standards while teaching us that excellence without empathy is empty."

AKU's graduates are filling important workforce gaps. For example, in a country with a nurse-to-population ratio of just 5.2 per 10,000, AKU alumni now hold high-level leadership positions in approximately 80 schools of nursing and midwifery. In 2025, AKU secured more than USD\$100 million in research funding, a sign that leading global institutions hold its research capabilities in high regard. Across AKU, 27 faculty members were ranked among the top two percent of scientists globally in a well-known study conducted by a researcher at Stanford University.

"Pakistan's young people are inclusive, comfortable across faiths and perspectives, and aware that a divided society cannot meet shared challenges. Digitally fluent, they see technology not as dis-

ruption but as opportunity – to expand knowledge, build skills, and apply learning in practical ways," noted Dr Sulaiman Shahabuddin, President of AKU.

To ensure talented students with limited financial means are able to attend AKU, the University provides financial assistance, to a large portion of the student body. In the last academic year, the University provided assistance to 72 percent of students across all classes and programmes in Pakistan.

Noorish Khan, Syeda Tasmiya Mohiuddin, Dr. Hamzah Jehanzeb, and Sara Karim Sadruddin received Best Graduate Awards in their respective undergraduate programmes in Dental Hygiene, Education, Medicine, and Nursing.

Also present at the ceremony was Shamsh Kassim-Lakha, Founding President of AKU and Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the University of Central Asia, a sister university of AKU within the Aga Khan Development Network.

The University conferred Awards of Distinction upon several faculty and staff, recognising their sustained contributions to innovation, research and leadership. Professor Emeritus Mushtaq Ahmed received the President's Medal, one of AKU's highest honours, in recognition of his extraordinary service as an eminent surgeon and academic leader.



Three Historic Monuments Unveiled at Lahore Fort

LAHORE: On Sunday, 25 January 2026, historic monuments at Lahore Fort, the Sikh-era Hammam, the Athdara Pavilion, and the Loh Temple, were officially inaugurated following extensive conservation work funded by the U.S. Ambassadors Fund for Cultural Preservation (AFCP). The restoration was carried out by Aga Khan Cultural Service – Pakistan (AKCS-P) in partnership with the Walled City of Lahore Authority (WCLA). The unveiling is part of a broader initiative, “Preservation and Promotion of Cross-Cultural Edifices of Lahore Fort,” which aims to safeguard and celebrate the Fort’s rich heritage. Previously, two other historic sites, the Sikh-era Temple and the Imperial Zenana Mosque, were restored under the same program. Together, these projects cover seven key monuments within the Fort, reflecting its layered history of Mughal, Sikh, Hindu, and British influences.

The Loh Temple complex, near the Alamgiri Gate, includes interconnected chambers that contain ritual features indicative of Hindu practices, alongside elements associated with the Sikh Era. The Athdara Pavilion, located in the northwest precinct of the Shah Jahan Forecourt Quadrangle, was built during the Sikh period and historically functioned as a public court. The Sikh Hammam, situated at the northeast corner of the Sheesh Mahal Quadrangle, was

originally constructed during Emperor Shah Jahan’s reign and later adapted as a hammam during the Sikh era.

The inauguration ceremony, which took place at the Shah Burj Forecourt, was presided over by Provincial Minister for Minorities Affairs in Punjab, Sardar Ramesh Singh Arora, as the Chief Guest. Sandeep Paul, Public Affairs Officer of the U.S. Consulate in Lahore, was the guest of honour. The event brought together a diverse group of guests from academia, government, and the arts community. Opening remarks were delivered by Tausif Khawaja, CEO of AKCS-P, followed by speeches from Public Af-

fairs Officer Sandeep Paul of the U.S. Consulate and Najamus Saqib, Director General of WCLA, highlighting the cultural significance of the Fort and the importance of its preservation. Speaking on the occasion, Sandeep Paul highlighted the strategic partnership between the United States and Pakistan, noting heritage conservation as a key area of collaboration. “Preserving the past is not about nostalgia; it is about investing wisely in the future. These restored monuments will attract visitors, create economic opportunities, and stand as lasting symbols of what we can accomplish together,” he remarked.

Media collaboration is seen as a vital bridge to enhance mutual understanding, counter stereotypes, and highlight shared interests in a rapidly changing global landscape. The interaction concluded on a positive and forward-looking note, with both sides expressing optimism about future joint initiatives in media and beyond.
